15	Before we move into the
16	President's report, I'd
17	ask for consent to go off
18	the record to touch on
19	something real quick. All
20	in favor?
21	
22	(All signify aye.)
23	

1	(Off the record
2	discussion.)
3	
4	PRESIDENT POWERS:
5	Back on. Since the last
6	time we met we've been
7	quite busy. As you're
8	quite well aware, the
9	Governor put into his
10	Executive Budget, some
11	amendments, Thirty Day
12	Amendments, called Part
13	KK, that was the language
14	that was in there.
15	Through that push
16	we were actually pretty
17	successful. NYSCOPBA was
18	successful in preventing
19	the Governor from imposing
20	a new law to allow the
21	Commissioner to
22	unilaterally discipline
23	departmental employees

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without the contractual 1 2 disciplinary process. 3 This proposed new law 4 would have authorized the 5 Commissioner to place 6 restrictions on types of 7 bags and containers 8 employees are permitted to 9 carry into a correctional 10 facility, thereby making 11 NYSCOPBA's current clear 12 plastic bag improper 13 practice litigation. 14 From the moment the 15 Governor amended his 16 Executive Budget to 17 include these provisions, NYSCOPBA'S legislative 18 19 team worked diligently 20 with the leadership and 21 many members of both 22 houses of the legislature 23 to convince the

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1 legislature to officially 2 reject the proposal. 3 NYSCOPBA argued it was an excessive over reach by 4 5 the Governor and that his 6 proposed amendments were 7 shortsighted in order to 8 circumvent the collective 9 bargaining process in New 10 York. 11 Agreeing with our 12 arguments, the legislature 13 removed this language in 14 the enacted Executive 15 Thus, having the Budget. 16 improper practice back on 17 the table, which the first day of hearing is May 8th. 18 19 First day of the hearings 20 for the improper practice 21 regarding the clear bag is 22 May 8th.

We also had some

success in obtaining some 1 2 language through Senator Helming's office, in 3 conjunction with Senator 4 5 Gallivan's office, in 6 securing a million dollars 7 for additional security 8 measures in our 9 facilities. Obviously that money 10 11 goes to the Department, we 12 don't have a say as to how 13 it gets spent but I made 14 it clear that we want to 15 be part of the discussion 16 as it goes forward. 17 Recognizing that we -- a million dollars probably 18 19 isn't going to go a hell 20 of a long way, but it 21 might be able to add some 22 K-9s or some other 23 protective gear that we've

been asking for and some 1 2 other things. 3 The Board here has been 4 putting together a labor 5 management meeting. Ι 6 believe that meeting is 7 going to take place on May 8 4th. We've got many 9 agenda items that are 10 going forward. If you got 11 anything, get them to your 12 chief sector stewards or 13 your Regional VPs for 14 discussion. 15 So, again, with that 16 million dollars we'll keep 17 you abreast as to how we roll that. More 18 19 importantly, in the final 20 minutes of the Executive 21 Budget, NYSCOPBA was very 22 successful in being able 23 to secure language in this

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1 budget to protect 2 something that we've been 3 talking about for some time, that would be the 4 5 Janus versus AFSCME case. 6 With that, we have 7 provisions that were put 8 into the Executive Budget 9 that protects labor in New York State. Make no 10 11 mistake about it, we're 12 not good about patting 13 ourselves on the back here 14 and many members in this 15 audience are due credit for this as well. 16 17 We know that you lobbied your district 18 19 offices and your 20 legislators in your 21 office, in your districts 22 and your home towns. More 23 importantly, the

5	PAC Committee, which did
6	an outstanding job on the
7	20th of March in our
8	efforts to secure this
9	language.
10	And I'm going to
11	bring I'm going to
12	briefly fill you in and
13	I'll bring Keith and Chris
14	up here to explain the
15	minute details that went
16	into it. But it was
17	ultimately at the end, it
18	was the last thing
19	discussed during the
20	Executive Budget process.
21	If you're not familiar
22	with that process, it's
23	quite a process. There's

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a lot of horse trading going on, there's a lot of back and forth, and there's a lot of ups and downs that go along with it.

But one of our biggest concerns regarding this Janus versus AFSCME which was free riders. Having members opt out and still receive all the benefits that a union provides to all its members. At the end of the day there was a couple pieces of different legislation one of them being from a Senator in Manhattan. She's a good friend of labor, her intentions were good, but it didn't secure the fact that we could protect

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ourselves from free 1 2 riders. 3 Meaning that her 4 legislation basically 5 allowed them to get and 6 gather everything. At the 7 end of the day, through 8 many back and forth with 9 many unions, and we worked in conjunction as we 10 11 reported in this room to 12 many law enforcement 13 entities that we worked 14 closely with, namely the 15 State Troopers, the Public -- PEC, Public 16 17 Employees Conference, and many other members of the 18 19 law enforcement community 20 in New York State. 21 A lot of it all came 22 together right towards the 23 very end. And at the very

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end we walked with in with 1 2 the Senate Republicans to 3 get it done. I want to give you kind of a quick 4 5 overview, Keith can 6 probably do a better job. 7 But initially, the AFL 8 CIO and NYSUT were not 9 necessarily on board with 10 what we were looking to 11 get accomplished. 12 that was to avoid having 13 to represent free riders. 14 That was our struggle. 15 It was a difficult 16 struggle. It was tough because we had to be 17 careful as to how the 18 19 information got out. 20 would have liked to have 21 been a little more 22 transparent about the 23 process and to share more

information. 1 2 But the minute this 3 legislation got done, 4 within twenty minutes 5 we had advocate groups out 6 there, conservative advocates out there that 7 8 are familiar with Trump 9 and the Koch Brothers, who 10 are the conservative sway 11 that don't want unions; 12 don't support unions in 13 any way, shape or form. And they came out 14 fighting right away. 15 The 16 damage was done because we 17 got it done. NYSCOPBA got it done. With your 18 19 direction, with our 20 direction, at the end of 21 the day NYSCOPBA played a 22 huge role in saving labor 23 in New York State.

We brought it at the 1 2 very end. And that very 3 end came with what's 4 called DFR language, fair 5 representation language. 6 With that language we are 7 allowed to be able to 8 protect all our benefits, 9 all our members. Not much 10 changes other than we're 11 going to be asking you 12 guys to do a little bit 13 more back in the 14 facilities. And we'll get 15 into that a little bit 16 later. 17 I'll have Keith step up 18 and Chris, and kind of 19 give you the minute 20 details as to how this all 21 came together. And then 22 we'll explain what we're 23 going to need from you

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1	guys back in the
2	facilities as far as the
3	implementation of this,
4	once the Janus ruling
5	comes down.
6	Which hasn't happened
7	yet. We're anticipating
8	June May or June.
9	Keith?
10	KEITH JACQUES: All
11	right. Before I talk
12	about JanJanus I think i
13	just want to touch a
14	little bit on that million
15	dollar appropriation that
16	President Powers talked
17	about. It's a million
18	dollars specific to safety
19	initiatives for our union.
20	A million dollars
21	doesn't sound like a lot,
22	but believe me at the time
23	when there's a 4.4 billion

1 dollar projected deficit, 2 and there was very limited 3 money on the table the 4 legislation could utilize 5 for law enforcement 6 related services, for 7 NYSCOPBA to be given a 8 million dollars, whether 9 it be for K-9s, pepper 10 spray, it's going to be 11 for a safety initiative. 12 That was a huge 13 accomplishment and that's 14 largely a result of a 15 relationship that this 16 organization has with the 17 Senate Republicans. That relationship with the 18 19 Senate Republicans is also 20 why we were able to have 21 success with our DFR push 22 to alleviate the potential 23 impact of Janus.

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So what the law now 1 2 does, it allows the union 3 as a whole to withhold 4 from nonmembers 5 representation. So the 6 union doesn't have to 7 provide representation at 8 the Q and A, disciplinary 9 hearing, Article 78 proceeding, Section 71, 72 10 11 Civil Service Law cases; 12 the union has to do 13 nothing for nonmembers in that regard. 14 15 The union can also withhold all the benefits 16 17 that are outside of the contract for nonmembers. 18 19 Whether it be legal 20 defense fund, Rainy Day 21 Fund. 24/7 access to an attorney. All those 22 23 benefits that members get,

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1 nonmembers will not get 2 that. 3 What nonmembers will get is the benefits that 4 5 are negotiated. You know, 6 the salaries that are 7 negotiated as part of the 8 contract. And they'll get 9 assistance from the union 10 with respect to 11 contractual grievances. 12 But that's something 13 the union didn't want to 14 give up anyways. wanted to make sure that 15 the union has control of 16 17 that grievance process. If Bob Cronin is handed a 18 19 grievance for a member, it 20 gets to Step 2, the union 21 has control of it, he has 22 the ability to look at 23 this thing and say, you

know what, this is not 1 2 something the union is 3 going to push forward. 4 If we lost the ability 5 to maintain control over 6 the grievances, that would not be a good situation. 7 8 If you had a nonmember 9 filing a grievance that could negatively impact 10 11 the entire bargaining unit 12 and somehow that grievance 13 gets in before of a roque 14 arbitrator and a decision is issued that could 15 16 impact the whole union. 17 But again, the DFR 18 language that we wanted, 19 we virtually got 20 everything that we asked 21 for. And it was very --22 it was dicey, it was 23 tricky. As Mike said, the

1 teacher's union, the AFL, 2 they were pushing another 3 type of proposal that they were selling as their 4 5 Janus related fix. And it 6 was the Senator Alcantara bill. 7 8 It's a good bill. 9 also became part of the enacted law. But it did 10 11 absolutely nothing to deal 12 with free riders. 13 Nothing. NYSCOPBA working 14 with PEC, we were the 15 group that had the DFR 16 language. And to be very 17 honest with you guys, it 18 was NYSCOPBA that got that 19 done at the end of the 20 day. 21 Senate Republicans came 22 to NYSCOPBA, what do you 23 guys need, what do you

1 guys want to see. And it 2 was back and forth, give 3 and take, there were times 4 as negotiations were 5 winding down and things 6 were falling off the 7 table, they were falling back on the table. 8 9 But make no bones about 10 it, I know there are 11 people taking credit for 12 that, but this 13 organization is the reason 14 that the DFR language is 15 now in place. It's now enacted into law. 16 The 17 union can now withhold representation services 18 19 from nonmembers if the 20 Janus ruling occurs the 21 way we believe it's going 22 to and people decide they 23 don't want to be

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1 represented by a union 2 anymore; now you have the 3 ability to say, go ahead, 4 we're not going to give 5 you anything. 6 But it's going to be up 7 to the union, the 8 organization to explain to 9 the members now all the benefits of being a part 10 11 of the union and all 12 negative potential impacts 13 of walking away from the 14 union and what that could 15 mean to somebody who 16 decides to walk away. Look, it's very 17 difficult at times to get 18 19 proper communication from 20 here in to the facilities. 21 And so, the goal was to 22 make sure you do 23 everything you can to

1	educate the members so
2	when Janus comes down, we
3	need the entire membership
4	to be educated on what it
5	means to be a member of
6	NYSCOPBA and what it means
7	if you decide you don't
8	want to be a member of
9	NYSCOPBA, what it is
10	you're going to lose.
11	Any questions on the
12	Janus related legislation,
13	the Janus related
14	enactment?
15	MIKE CARLSON: Mike
16	Carlson. Can you go to
17	any union? Can you bow
18	out of NYSCOPBA and say,
19	hey, I want to be in CSEA?
20	KEITH JACQUES: No.
21	No.
22	MIKE CARLSON: Okay.
23	KEITH JACQUES: No.

1	You're still a part of the
2	bargaining unit. You just
3	don't want to be a member
4	of the union. So this
5	protects so if the
6	member decides that they
7	don't want to be a part of
8	NYSCOPBA, they're still a
9	part of the bargaining
10	unit but the union no
11	longer has to give them
12	any type of representation
13	at all, with respect to
14	those areas that we talked
15	about.
16	DONN ROWE: Rowe, Hale
17	Creek. Keith, what about
18	25-9 money?
19	BILL SHEEHAN: Donn,
20	25-9 money since that is
21	funded by the state, that
22	would have to be available
23	all members of the

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1	bargaining unit.
2	DONN ROWE: So any
3	program that we fund with
4	that, like life insurance,
5	all that, that would be
6	available to a nonmember.
7	BILL SHEEHAN: Yes,
8	because it would be
9	considered a contractual
10	benefit which goes to all
11	members.
12	DONN ROWE: Okay.
13	KEITH JACQUES: Any
14	other questions?
15	JIMMY SONKO: Jim
16	Sonko, Fishkill. I just
17	got one question, it might
18	be off topic a little bit.
19	But for the years I've
20	been involved, all I ever
21	hear is that seniority is
22	got to be negotiated and
23	some men in this room went

1	on strike for that. Is
2	this is is there going
3	to be a difference between
4	a union member and a non
5	paying dues member on bids
6	for jobs or seniority, or
7	is there any way we can
8	get any language like
9	that?
10	KEITH JACQUES: There
11	will be no change.
12	Because they're still a
13	part of the unit, they're
14	subject to the same
15	provisions of the
16	contract.
17	JIMMY SONKO: Okay.
18	KEITH JACQUES: Chris,
19	do you have anything?
20	CHRIS DURYEA: I think
21	Keith summed up Janus very
22	well. You got me now?
23	All right. It was a

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1 frustrating process. 2 was a cloak and dagger 3 process. Because I think Mike said it succintly, 4 5 there's a lot of folks out 6 there in the conservative realm that would have 7 caused a whole lot of 8 9 problems with our 10 conservative Republican 11 bids upstate. 12 So we had to keep it 13 totally underground. So, 14 we were able to lobby them very quietly and get this 15 16 thing stuck in at the very end. Otherwise, if we put 17 in our own bill, they 18 19 would have come in and 20 they would have cut us up. 21 It would have been divide 22 and conquer, and we would 23 have been in a very poor

1 position. 2 I think -- we had a lot of balls in this budget. 3 We had the million bucks 4 5 on the table, we had the 6 Janus piece. By the end, 7 you had AFL CIO and the 8 teacher's union coming to 9 us saying, guys, can you 10 get the Republicans in the 11 right place, we would like 12 to be your DFR language. 13 Literally at the end of 14 the day, within the last ten days. So it was us 15 16 who delivered. It wasn't 17 the Troopers, it wasn't PEC, it was us; a 18 19 statewide organization. 20 So I think -- we should 21 just back up here, kind of 22 at least in the last year, 23 it's tough to pat

ourselves on the back 1 2 here, but this a big one. 3 Also, we had a discipline 4 piece. The Governor came 5 in late dropped this Part 6 KK, which would have given 7 the Commissioner outright 8 authority on discipline. 9 I mean, it was a shot over 10 our bow; a very loud one. 11 It was very -- when 12 we were very successful. 13 We spent a lot of time talking with the PAC 14 committee over the course 15 16 of the last five months 17 about, look, the political winds are shifting in 18 19 Albany. The Senate has a 20 one vote majority. 21 That vote by the way is 22 a Democrat from Brooklyn. 23 So, as we're eyeing the

shifting political winds 1 2 in advance of this 3 upcoming election, we've spent a lot of time making 4 5 some new friends on the 6 Democratic side of the 7 aisle, both the Assembly and the Democratic 8 9 Conference. 10 I think a good example 11 of moving that ball 12 forward, when the Governor 13 submitted that discipline 14 piece, the Assembly rejected it, as did the 15 16 Senate. So, in doing so, 17 the Assembly heard us right off the rip. We 18 19 didn't have to lobby it 20 that far. They said look, 21 this is obviously a shot 22 across your bow, you guys 23 are negotiating a

1 contract in good faith, 2 this is bullshit, so we're 3 going to reject it. 4 So we found ourselves 5 in a very good position 6 getting that thing across 7 this year. I think it's a 8 feather in our cap and it 9 put us in a stronger 10 position as we go in to 11 have these further 12 discussions with John, so 13 I will just add that. 14 Any questions on that? 15 All right. Thanks. 16 17 (All applause.) 18 19 PRESIDENT POWERS: So 20 with that, ultimately when 21 this Janus decision comes

facilities, anybody who 1 2 chooses to opt out. We'll 3 be talking about some 4 language, some 5 constitution language a 6 little bit later on today. 7 I'm not going to get 8 into the weeds regarding 9 the political landscape. But to kind of reiterate 10 11 what Chris said, the 12 timing with all this, was 13 really ideal for us. And 14 it worked out. We were 15 able to take advantage of 16 that timing and of 17 everything that occurred. And we were able to 18 19 really secure some good 20 solid language and get 21 some good solid victories. 22 As Keith said, in a deficit we were able to 23

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1	secure a million dollars.
2	That's not too shabby in
3	the grand scheme of
4	things.
5	But the work ultimately
6	will end up back in your
7	facilities as well.
8	That's why it's important
9	to take this information
10	back, share it with your
11	members, share it with the
12	union meetings and discuss
13	it and talk about. And
14	make sure that everybody
15	is on the same page.
16	And, you know, that's
17	basically where we're at
18	right now. Does anybody
19	got anything for me?
20	
21	(No response.)
22	
23	PRESIDENT POWERS: No?

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1	Thank you. Tammy?
2	EXECUTIVE VP SAWCHUK:
3	Good afternoon everyone.
4	NYSCOPBA continues to make
5	demands of the Department
6	to ensure the safety of
7	all of our members. We
8	now have OC spray that
9	will be implemented by the
10	end of the year. That's a
11	positive step in the right
12	direction.
13	Our jobs in corrections
14	and in the corrections
15	field require a type of
16	vigilence that differs
17	from most other jobs and
18	professions. Vigilence is
19	maintained through
20	professionism, dedication
21	and maturity.
22	Being aware of
23	ourselves and what is

1 happening around us is the 2 bedrock to our safety. 3 Maintaining a safe and secure working environment 4 5 is the most important 6 issue to this board. Just a little bit about 7 8 Janus. It's each and every one of our 9 10 responsibility to ensure 11 that every member stays in 12 tact with this 13 organization. It's mine, 14 it's the Board's, it's the 15 BAs, the VPs. It's the 16 member, the every day 17 member must protect this organization. 18 19 We must ensure that 20 each and every person at 21 our facility that puts on 22 that blue or white shirt 23 is a union member. And we

1 got to make that happen. 2 It is our due diligence 3 each and every day to 4 ensure that they stay. 5 And I hope that that 6 message is clear. I hope 7 it gets out to the 8 meetings. I hope it 9 resonates with everybody 10 in this room how important 11 that is. It's to protect 12 this organization. 13 Discuss the SHU task 14 force a little bit today. 15 Anybody who has a step 16 down program, please get 17 with me. I'm hearing numerous issues about 18 19 staffing levels, about the 20 violence, about the 21 reoccurence, the second 22 chances. 23 If you have any issues

1 with the step down 2 program, please get with 3 me and provide me documentation of any 4 5 misbehavior reports or 6 incidents that occurred 7 with that program. Did an interview with 8 9 Spectrum News on the violence and the 10 11 contraband in our prisons 12 in February, February 13 18th. Met with ISO Green 14 about issues in the Utica 15 parole office that have 16 now -- we've rectified 17 whatever they needed out there, we got that done. 18 19 There was issues last 20 EA with the Desmond. 21 met with Jack Rady from 22 the Desmond and those 23 issues have been rectified

as well. 1 Mike and I met with 2 3 Senator Gallivan and 4 Helming on March 6th and 5 that was a very productive 6 meeting. That actually 7 led to some things you 8 seen in the state budget. 9 We had our legislative 10 reception on March 20th. 11 We had a fundraiser with 12 That was Hastings. 13 another productive meeting 14 with him that led to some 15 of the things in the 16 budget language. Fundraiser for 17 Make-A-Wish. Attended a 18 19 service for CO Miller out 20 of Green Haven. 21 And I'd like to share 22 some things. I mean, I 23 know I poked a little fun

at the last EA, so playing 1 2 some myth busters here. I 3 want to go over some of 4 the numbers for Q and As. 5 There's misinformation out 6 there and I want to clear 7 it up. For the month of 8 9 January there was a total 10 of forty-five Q and As 11 throughout the state. For 12 the month of February 13 there was 33. And one 14 phone call I got was there was four hundred in the 15 16 month of March; there was 17 not, there was seventeen. That's the Q and As. 18 19 Let's talk a little bit 20 about the thousand people 21 that are still locked out. 22 As i said at the last 23 meeting, there's not.

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1	Currently there's a
2	hundred and ten members
3	that are locked out.
4	Sixty-five of them are for
5	outside charges;
6	forty-five are for
7	internal charges.
8	There are a hundred and
9	thirty-four members in
10	this organization that are
11	agency fee. They're not
12	in good standing. Those
13	lists have been provided
14	to the vice presidents.
15	And as I said earlier,
16	it's imperative that we
17	get those members educated
18	and to sign a card.
19	There should be
20	absolutely no non members
21	with NYSCOPBA. Catch A
22	Falling Star. Catch A
23	Falling Star, as some

might believe, is not a 1 2 program that's in place 3 for the Western Region. 4 Catch A Falling Star is 5 available to every single 6 member. And I find it troubling 7 8 when I get a phone call 9 because someone is not comfortable with going to 10 11 EAP and say they can't go 12 to Catch a Falling Star 13 because that's specific to one region. It is not. 14 15 It is not for one region. It is for the 16 17 entire organization. here is a couple numbers 18 19 with them. I can't get 20 into the whole statistics 21 because of 22 confidentiality. 23 But I can tell you

this, there were 271 cases 1 2 last year where there was intervention. Whether 3 that be intervention with 4 5 suicide, drug, alcohol, 6 domestic violence; the 7 program is available. Ιf 8 there is a member in need, who is not comfortable 9 with going to EAP, please 10 11 you're going to be given 12 cards with the numbers, 13 every member is going to 14 have a card to put in their wallet for Catch A 15 16 Falling Star. 17 It is imperative that we safe lives. If you see 18 19 something, say something. 20 Reach out. Give them the 21 number, direct them to the 22 website or just give them the card. 23

QWL funding, still not 1 2 available, we don't have a 3 contract. So for those of 4 you who asked me today 5 regarding funds for QWL 6 projects, not yet. 7 Do you have anything 8 for me? Like I said, step 9 down program, anybody, 10 please bring the issues to 11 me. 12 DONN ROWE: Donn Rowe 13 Hale Creek. The OC spray, 14 did the department come to 15 us with the lesson plan or 16 the requirements prior? EXECUTIVE VP SAWCHUK: 17 I don't recall them giving 18 19 us the lesson plan because 20 it was instituted first 21 with the trainees at the 22 Albany Training Academy. 23 DONN ROWE: My only

thing obviously it's a 1 2 great thing, great tool, 3 but the whole spraying officers in the their face 4 5 is ridiculous, it's 6 degrading. The only 7 reason why they want us 8 sprayed in the face is so 9 we know what the inmate is 10 gonna feel. 11 Obviously we've tried 12 to address this at state 13 stayed wide labor 14 management, real gas 15 training, real tower training, whether it's 16 17 dummies or whatever. But 18 the whole spraying an 19 officer is absolutely 20 ridiculous. The only way 21 that's gonna have is I'm 22 stupid enough to get in-between an inmate and 23

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1	an officer who is going to
2	use it, or an officer
3	accidentally sprays me.
4	EXECUTIVE VP SAWCHUK:
5	Right.
6	DONN ROWE: And have
7	they talked to you about
8	what directive they're
9	going to incorporate it
10	in? It's not incorporated
11	yet in the directive?
12	EXECUTIVE VP SAWCHUK:
13	No. No. It's not in
14	the use of force
15	directive.
16	DONN ROWE: I think
17	probably for the statewide
18	we should address it.
19	EXECUTIVE VP SAWCHUK:
20	We will.
21	DONN ROWE: Is it going
22	to be annual? The whole
23	exposure thing, that's

1	bullshit. They want us
2	to know what the inmate
3	feels, which is
4	ridiculous.
5	EXECUTIVE VP SAWCHUK:
6	Right. Joe?
7	JOE CHRISTIANO: Joe
8	Christiano, Albany
9	Training Academy. Donn,
10	with that, that's not
11	coming from the
12	department, that's a DCJS
13	mandate that every
14	employee get it. It's not
15	fueled by the department,
16	it's fueled by DCJS.
17	DONN ROWE: DCJS is the
18	ones that wants us to know
19	what the inmate feels.
20	That's bullshit.
21	JOE CHRISTIANO: But,
22	when you go through the
23	Academy you're put through

1 chemical agents so you 2 know what to feel. 3 DONN ROWE: Joe, I'm 4 not gonna debate chemical 5 agents. Chemical agents 6 is totatlly different. 7 Chemical agents you should be trained in. You should 8 9 be trained in yearly. You 10 should be put in 11 situations where you're 12 going into an outside area 13 without a mask, you should 14 be trained with a mask on 15 going into a unit or 16 gallery, dragging a dummy 17 out. We've asked for that. 18 19 We've actually asked for 20 that and they said, oh, we 21 can't do it, money, 22 exposure to the area, 23 whatever it may be. But

1	the OC spray is simply for
2	the use on an inmate.
3	It's not, you know, the
4	whole exposure thing.
5	JOE CHRISTIANO: Well,
6	with that, all law
7	enforcement agencies that
8	use it, routinely officers
9	get over spray. It will
10	come off that person.
11	DONN ROWE: I'm sure
12	they do. We should do
13	some kind of over spray
14	training. As far as
15	spraying it in an officers
16	face, it's only they're
17	only doing it because of
18	the inmate.
19	JOE CHRISTIANO: Okay,
20	well, the inmate gets .7
21	percent oil base and the
22	officer is getting .2
23	percent liquid water base,

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1 and it's in one eye. You 2 need to know the effects. 3 DONN ROWE: Give us 4 real gas training. 5 CHUCK THOMAS: Chuck 6 Thomas, Auburn. We use 7 the hell out of OC spray. 8 All right. We do. We use 9 the hell out of it there. And I'll tell you this 10 11 right now, I'd much rather 12 be sprayed by another 13 fellow officer and know how it feels, not to bring 14 15 myself to the level of an 16 inmate. But when you're 17 out in that yard fighting a forty man fight and 18 19 every guy out there, 20 female, male is dumping 21 pepper spray and you get 22 over spray, splash black 23 and you're turning around

swinging your baton, at 1 2 least you know, oh, I know 3 how to deal with this at this point in time and 4 5 continue on to fight 6 through. It gives you 7 that effect. 8 So, I know a lot of 9 people may disagree on how I stand on it, but then 10 11 again, we use a lot of 12 that stuff and it's 13 awesome, I'll tell you 14 right now. 15 JIMMY SONKO: То further touch on what the 16 brother on the other side 17 of the room said, I have 18 19 had to use the spray 20 numerous times myself and 21 I responded. And my eyes 22 are shut at the end. Му 23 shirt might not be orange,

1	but I can't see. So, it
2	is good to know what to
3	expect.
4	EXECUTIVE VP SAWCHUK:
5	Thank you.
6	PRESIDENT POWERS:
7	Toby.
8	TREASURER HOGAN:
9	Good afternoon.
10	Treasurer's report. Total
11	cash is 10.5 million.
12	Unrestricted bond, 6.8
13	million. Restricted bond,
14	1.489 million. Rainy Day
15	Fund, sixty-three
16	thousand. Legal Defense
17	Fund, eight hundred
18	thirty-nine thousand in
19	checking, for a total of
20	2.328 million.
21	The PAC account has
22	94.5 thousand. Just to
23	let everyone know we have

a union leave bill coming 1 2 up in May. I don't know 3 what the amount is going to be yet, but we have to 4 5 address that. 6 The annual audit for 7 NYSCOPBA has been 8 completed. I'm waiting 9 for them to give me back December's treasurer's 10 11 report so I can post it on 12 the website. 13 And you all got e-mails 14 about the Quill account. 15 I had to fix the Quill 16 account since there was a 17 breech in security. It's been addressed. It's been 18 19 fixed. Other than that, 20 that's all I got. Any 21 questions? 22 JIMMY SONKO: Fishkill, 23 hey Toby, how are we doing

1 with the paybacks? Couple 2 meetings ago we talked 3 about going after some of 4 that money we weren't able 5 to retrieve for the Rainy 6 Day Fund. 7 TREASURER HOGAN: I put 8 in seven a couple days ago 9 for the outside law firm that's going after them. 10 11 And I signed two more this 12 morning to go after them, 13 looking for garnished 14 wages and stuff like that. 15 But other than that, we've 16 been doing pretty good at 17 getting the checks back, we're not as bad as it was 18 19 two months ago, so yes. 20 NICOLE BELL: Nicole 21 Bell, Sullivan. I was 22 reading the treasury 23 report, what is the

1	Buffalo Bills two or three
2	payments for fifteen
3	thousand dollars?
4	TREASURER HOGAN:
5	That's through the PR
6	line, it's advertising at
7	the Buffalo Bills.
8	NICOLE BELL: So that's
9	advertising for us?
10	TREASURER HOGAN: Yes.
11	NICOLE BELL: Not the
12	tickets like the Yankees
13	thing?
14	TREASURER HOGAN: No.
15	No.
16	NICOLE BELL: Okay.
17	TREASURER HOGAN:
18	Anything else? Thank you.
19	PRESIDENT POWERS:
20	Move into department
21	reports. Sharon?
22	SHARON SMITH: Good
23	afternoon. There's not

too much new in the -- as 1 2 far as the health 3 insurance. I just thought 4 I would mention I sent you 5 a memo last week regarding 6 a couple updates 7 concerning the Empire Plan 8 only, not the HMOs. 9 The first being the 10 shingles shot, you know, 11 there's a second drug out 12 now for shingles shot. 13 should have had a beer for 14 lunch. It is now covered effective 4/1. It's a 15 16 covered expense, everybody 17 will get two shots. There covered both through mail 18 19 order and through the 20 pharmacies, the Caremark's 21 Pharmacy network. If you 22 get a scrip, you can go to

the pharmacy and you can

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1 get it there. 2 So, again, that took 3 effect April 1st. And I think it's age fifty and 4 5 older you're eligible for 6 that shot. The second issue with mental health 7 8 substance abuse program. 9 For -- and this is just concerning out of network, 10 11 for those that go to out 12 of network facility. 13 Basically inpatient out 14 of network facility. There were issues, I know 15 16 I had gotten some calls and I think some other 17 unions had also, about as 18 19 you know if you go to an 20 out of network facility 21 and the visit is paid, the 22 monies go back to the 23 member. They get the

1 check and they pay the 2 provider, because the 3 insurance company doesn't have a contract with that 4 5 provider. 6 Well, there were 7 issues, you know, certain 8 people getting a check for 9 twenty, thirty thousand dollars and they cashed 10 11 the check and they don't 12 pay the provider. And, 13 you know, the other family 14 members that create that, 15 it can create quite a 16 problem. 17 So that was brought to the state and the 18 19 insurance company Beacon, and they made a decision 20 21 as of March 1st, that on 22 the claim form, if you 23 have an out of network

service, you have to 1 2 submit a claim form with 3 the charges, on that claim form there is now a box 4 5 that you can check that 6 the money -- you authorize 7 that money to go directly 8 to the facility, so then 9 it won't go to any 10 particular personal, it 11 will go directly there for 12 the payment. 13 So, that's what they 14 did to try to alleviate 15 this because they don't have contracts with those 16 17 providers per se, so this 18 was the way they came up 19 to try and help alleviate 20 that kind of problem. 21 So, that's all I have. 22 I don't really have 23 anything else that's new

1	at this point. I don't
2	know if anybody has any
3	questions on that or any
4	of that concerning health
5	insurance?
6	
7	(No response.)
8	
9	SHARON SMITH: Okay.
10	Thank you.
11	MIANO WESTERN REGION
12	VP: Thank you.
13	EXECUTIVE VP SAWCHUK:
14	Jocelyn?
15	JOCELYN GLEASON: Good
16	afternoon. So, I just
17	want to talk about I had a
18	meeting with DOCCS, PEF,
19	CSEA and Council 82
20	yesterday, on work place
21	violence risk assessment
22	training.
23	PEF was approved for a

1	shift grant to fund the
2	training. So we're
3	looking to do training
4	from May through December,
5	we're going to do five
6	locations. The first
7	training is going to be
8	set for May 30th and May
9	31st.
10	It's going to be for
11	Auburn, Five Points,
12	Cayuga, Elmira, South
13	Port, Willard, Mid State,
14	Marcy, Cape Vincent,
15	Watertown and Mohawk. The
16	shift grant covers for the
17	hotel and the travel
18	expenses.
19	Each facility is
20	allotted eight
21	participants, two can be
22	from each bargaining unit.
23	So we would be looking for

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two officers from 1 2 obviously NYSCOPBA. So, 3 if you're on the work 4 place violence prevention 5 committee already, then 6 you would be attending 7 this training, because 8 they want the person who 9 is on the work place violence committee to be 10 11 at the risk assessment 12 training. 13 If you don't have 14 somebody at your facility 15 that is on the committee, 16 then whoever attends the 17 training would then be part of that committee. 18 19 Does that make sense? 20 So, once you go to the 21 training, what it's 22 supposed to do is give you the skills to be able to 23

1	do the risk evaluation and
2	assessment which is
3	supposed to be done
4	yearly, under the work
5	place violence prevention
6	directive law. Okay. And
7	it's not being done at
8	most facilities.
9	So that's why we're
10	setting up this training.
11	So, if you are interested
12	in going to the training.
13	It's a two day training.
14	Like I said, the expenses
15	are through the shift
16	grant. You would stay in
17	the hotel, obviously.
18	Dinner is provided the
19	first day, it's like a
20	working dinner.
21	There's going to be
22	we're changing the
23	training, we did it for

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Wende, well, I didn't do 1 2 it, but Sue who did it 3 before. Did the Wende hub training, we're changing 4 5 taking the training, we're 6 taking the feedback from whoever went to that 7 8 training. 9 And we're going to make it a little more 10 interactive. We're 11 12 actually going to do like 13 a mock risk assessment and 14 what should be happening 15 at that work place 16 violence prevention 17 meeting, which happens 18 yearly. 19 Also, at the training 20 we're hoping to get AC 21 Kelly there. And two of 22 the executive team members 23 from your facility. So,

1	it's going to be a group.
2	Whoever is there at the
3	training is going to be
4	that work place violence
5	committee who is going to
6	be doing these risk
7	assessments.
8	Any questions? All
9	right. If you think of
10	anything after this, you
11	can call or e-mail me and
12	I can go over the training
13	a little bit more. If you
14	are interested, just let
15	your VP or BA know. Okay.
16	Thank you.
17	PRESIDENT POWERS:
18	Jimmy?
19	JIMMY MILLER: Just
20	five minutes.
21	PRESIDENT POWERS: Dan?
22	DAN VALENTE: Good
23	afternoon, everyone.

1 First thing I want to talk 2 about is the Lobby Day. 3 It's scheduled for May It's for chiefs 4 15th. 5 and/or one designee. 6 So, to date, we've only received about ten 7 8 responses. We're going to 9 be losing a block of hotel rooms within the next week 10 11 or so, so if you're going 12 to participate, please get 13 me or Lisa the information 14 so we can make sure your 15 rooms are booked and we 16 can get the meetings set 17 up. 18 If you're not able to 19 participate, please send 20 someone from your 21 facility. We want to have 22 all the facilities 23 represented, corrections

1	and law enforcement. We
2	want to have a good
3	showing. We've got a good
4	nicely filled room here
5	today, we should have this
6	same crew, the
7	stakeholders of the
8	organization coming to
9	Albany to lobby on the
10	legislative agenda, so
11	please get us the
12	information so we can get
13	you registered. She does
14	have forms out at the
15	registration desk, too.
16	As the guys earlier
17	touched on the Janus
18	information. There was a
19	lot of work that went into
20	that. It's been months in
21	the making, if not years
22	in the making. I know
23	this predates the

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Friedrichs case that came 1 2 before it. 3 And rest assured, 4 whatever happens with 5 Janus, there's probably 6 three, four, five other 7 cases in the hopper 8 waiting to come up the 9 ranks. So, for NYSCOPBA to take the lead on the 10 11 DFR language for the 12 changes to the Taylor Law, 13 it's monumental. This 14 really cannot be 15 understated. 16 They deserve all the credit. The Board, PAC 17 Committee, Chris and 18 19 Keith, everybody that 20 worked hard on this did a 21 really good job. Ιt 22 worked out perfectly. So, 23 everybody should be proud.

1 End of session stuff, 2 you know, we got through 3 the budget process. got some significant wins. 4 5 We're going to turn our 6 focus towards our 7 legislative agenda, much 8 of which is regurgitated 9 from years past. 10 We're going to continue 11 to push for the bills that 12 are important to our 13 members, the aggravated 14 harassment legislation, 15 the death gamble 16 legislation, possibly the vacation deferral 17 legislation. There's a 18 19 lot of bills out there 20 that are really good bills 21 that, while some do cost 22 money, they're worthy and we think our members are 23

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worthy of having those 1 benefits. 2 3 But there's some issues 4 that really come into play 5 within the last week or so 6 with how the end of the 7 session is going to play 8 out. If you haven't paid 9 attention to the make up 10 in the State Senate, it 11 got really complicated in 12 the last week. 13 Formerly or currently 14 or whatever the hell they 15 are at this point in time, 16 the Independent Demonstratic Conference 17 allegedly folded last week 18 19 into the main line 20 democratic the Governor's 21 doing, the Governer is 22 very weary of his primary 23 challenger Cynthia Nixon,

and the Working Families 1 2 Party endorsement. He 3 covets that line, so he's 4 doing everything in his 5 power to retain that line 6 so he can assure himself a 7 third term. 8 That's basically what 9 this all comes down to. But at the end of the day 10 11 the IDC they're hosting a 12 fundraiser tonight to 13 benefit the members of that defunct conference. 14 15 So, I'm a little bit confused to be honest with 16 17 you. So going forward it's 18 19 really going to be a 20 delicate situation. You 21 got Simcha Felder who is 22 basically the linch pin 23 holding that majority

1	conference together.
2	There's thirty-one
3	Republicans in elected
4	office. There's
5	twenty-nine currently
6	elected Democrats.
7	There's two open seats
8	that are going to be
9	decided in about two
10	weeks.
11	One is going to stay
12	democratic amends. One is
13	really, I don't know, it's
14	a toss up. It's
15	previously a Democratic
16	seat. So the way that
17	shakes out, it's going to
18	be interesting. But at
19	the end of the day, it's
20	not going to make a
21	difference, these two
22	special elections.
23	Because at the end of

1	the day all the
2	determining factors on who
3	is controlling the house
4	going forward is going to
5	be determined in the
6	November general election.
7	So all this IDC folding
8	into the Democratic
9	Conference, it's all smoke
10	and mirrors at this point
11	in time. It's the
12	Governor protecting his
13	hide. It's the IDC
14	members protecting
15	themselves from their
16	primary opponents so that
17	people aren't out
18	campaigning against them
19	so that they can get
20	re-elected.
21	It's the democratic
22	minority right now which
23	is yearning to be in power

for years, they've been 1 2 blocked year in and year 3 out by the IDC. 4 So, there's a lot of branches off of this 5 6 disgusting dead tree of 7 New York State Government 8 that we operate with. 9 It's the fact of the matter, it's disgusting. 10 11 It really is, but it's 12 what we have to work with. The Janus situation for 13 14 instance, for us to pull 15 that off with all these 16 competing interests was 17 amazing. And as was said earlier, transparency 18 19 necessarily wasn't in our 20 at best interest at that 21 point in time. 22 You know, we had a 23 plan, the plan came

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1	together perfectly. I
2	mean, there's I can't
3	argue with the effort and
4	the thought that went into
5	it. It was amazing. So,
6	I just wanted to give you
7	a little bit of that
8	background what to expect
9	going forward. It's
10	really a bumpy road and
11	it's really unchartered
12	territory.
13	So, we're going to
14	continue to monitor it and
15	we're going to you
16	know, we're going to
17	develop new relationships.
18	There's a lot of new ideas
19	we're going to have to
20	bring forward and we can't
21	do it without your help
22	and your support.
23	So come Lobby Day,

let's start this new 1 2 process going forward next 3 month and start making 4 those new friendships. 5 So, does anybody have any 6 questions about the budget 7 or Lobby days or anything 8 qoing forward? 9 It was asked about EOL time, if that's available 10 11 for the Lobby Day. 12 Unfortunately, you can't 13 use EOL time for political 14 activity. So, it would be 15 on each and every one of you to use your own time. 16 As we discussed at the 17 last EA, the regional 18 19 Lobby Days, now that the 20 budget is completed, we 21 held our PAC reception in 22 Albany. We need to start 23 branching out regionally

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1 doing those PAC receptions 2 in the regions, getting 3 members to come out beyond those in this room. 4 5 rank and file folks, get 6 them out there to talk, 7 talk about the issues. 8 So, I'll be working 9 with the Executive Board and the VPs and the PAC 10 11 committee about getting 12 those set up. And any 13 input you guys have on as 14 far as preferable 15 locations, things like 16 that, I'll be happy to be to have those 17 recommendations. 18 19 So, we'll be in touch 20 with those dates once they get firmed up. All right. 21 22 Thank you. 23 PRESIDENT POWERS: Jim

and Jim? Jim Smith from 1 2 Baker PR here. 3 JIMMY MILLER: Good afternoon. We invited Jim 4 5 Smith who is the vice 6 president of Baker PR, the 7 outside PR firm that you 8 guys contracted with to 9 briefly discuss what the comprehensive plan for the 10 11 remainder of the calendar 12 year that we've 13 collectively put together. What we've tried to do 14 15 now is diversify the 16 brandsing through our 17 media efforts through radio, social media. And 18 19 he will briefly discuss 20 and just have a Power 21 Point display. 22 He'll be able to talk 23 about what we're going to

1 try to do in the next year 2 to brand you better. 3 Also, bring more attention to some of the issues that 4 5 are most important to you. 6 The violence, the contraband, the tablet 7 8 issue. Things that we've 9 already highlighted 10 already, but we're going 11 to do our best to continue 12 that effort. And whenever 13 there's something going 14 on, getting as much media 15 coverage and attention as 16 we can. As well as some of the 17 18 good things, if you paid 19 attention to the website 20 there are good things 21 going on up in the north 22 country. Two occasions

COs revived an inmate and

23

revived also a civilian. 1 2 So, there are good things 3 that are going on and 4 we're going to do our best 5 to highlight those as well 6 as not only issues that 7 bring negative attention 8 to you. 9 So, I'll let Jim speak 10 for a couple moments and 11 he'll go through the 12 slides and then answer any 13 questions that you might 14 have on our plan moving forward. 15 16 JIM SMITH: Hi, 17 there. So, we've been on board for about four 18 19 months now, five months. 20 And we're getting to know 21 your issues a lot better 22 and we are able to achieve 23 some successes in the

1 areas that are important 2 to you. Your safety, the 3 contraband issue, the 4 tablet issue. 5 All of those things 6 that members are fighting 7 for, that NYSCOPBA is 8 fighting for, we are 9 trying to enhance. And I would say invigorate and 10 11 embrace what Jimmy is 12 doing and the staff is 13 doing in bringing your 14 issues to -- raising the 15 profile of the issues that 16 are important to you. 17 Next slide, please. So, some of the main roles 18 19 we have are to support the 20 communications that 21 NYSCOPBA does to members. 22 Newsletters, the graphics we do for some of the 23

1 newsletters you're getting 2 now are done in-house. 3 We're very eager to 4 support the government 5 affairs. Part of what you 6 do with Keith and his 7 gang, social media, 8 advertising support. 9 just did a TV commercial on the Janus issue with 10 11 mike in it and a voice 12 That should start over. 13 running I think this week, 14 so you will see that. 15 We're very happy with 16 the way that came out. 17 And of course Jimmy and the media relations areas 18 19 is what we're doing as well. 20 21 So, specifically what 22 have we done? These are 23 just a few examples, we

covered the prison tour that you had upstate. We arranged media interviews for television and other venues for Mike.

The vendor program advocacy that you were advocating for in Albany, we supported that. The contraband, the tablet and of course the Janus communications are going to be the biggest thing that we do going forward.

You had a good break
with the legislature and
the legislation that was
passed. We thought that
was really good but the
message has to continue to
get out there that member
support is very important
going forward when this

1 Supreme Court case comes 2 down. 3 So we'll be supporting 4 the legislative affairs 5 team throughout the rest 6 of the year on that. 7 Next slide, please. 8 And so, we'll be doing 9 that through social media, through all the channels 10 11 that we use today. 12 Website, social media, 13 advertising, straight up 14 media relations, story 15 replacements. Raising 16 awareness of the good work 17 you do and also the value that NYSCOPBA has for you 18 19 and your families at 20 protecting your rights and 21 your safety. So that's 22 important to us as well. Just a sample of the 23

newsletter that we've 1 2 done, next slide please. 3 Some of the media hits that we've gotten, these 4 5 are just a few of dozens 6 and dozens, I believe, 7 that we've had success 8 with. 9 Next slide. There's 10 Mike's appearance on 11 Capitol Tonight. We'll 12 have several opportunities 13 throughout the year to do 14 that. That's a statewide 15 program based here in 16 Albany, but that runs on 17 Spectrum News across the 18 state. 19 A couple samples of 20 some other articles. And 21 these are just some 22 headlines from some news 23 releases we did. We just

1 wanted to give you kind of 2 a taste of how frequent 3 they are. They are -they really picked up 4 5 around the legislative 6 activity. 7 But, you know, the 8 majority of the news 9 releases you do, are related to the work you 10 11 do. We are very 12 interested in finding out 13 what you do out of work, 14 what you do for the 15 community as we go forward, building that 16 image of you in the 17 community is very 18 19 important, is what we're going to be doing the next 20 21 year as well. And next 22 slide. 23 STEPHANIE FLANAGAN:

1	That's it.
2	JIM SMITH: Thank you
3	very much.
4	JIMMY MILLER: As this
5	goes forward, certainly
6	we'll take any input from
7	people. Some individuals
8	want to see different ways
9	of advertising through
10	billboards and we're
11	trying to obviously please
12	everybody. And there's
13	different areas of the
14	state where some things
15	work better than others,
16	some things are cost
17	effective in areas.
18	So, we're going to
19	continue to do that and
20	evaluate that as that
21	moves forward. But
22	certainly we'll take your
23	input as well.

1 SHAUN KEENAN: Keenan 2 out of Wende. In regards 3 to what was just put out there, the win that we had 4 5 with Part KK, what was the 6 other? With Janus, the 7 discipline and the Part KK 8 and the bags; what have we 9 done on that portion so 10 far to get it out? 11 That was a huge win for 12 us and I've seen zero. 13 JIMMY MILLER: It was 14 sent out to the members. 15 There was a message that 16 was sent out to the 17 members, what was that last week? 18 19 JIM SMITH: It was just 20 a couple days after that 21 happened. 22 JIMMY MILLER: So you

should have gotten that.

23

SHAUN KEENAN: If it 1 2 went out, I didn't get it. 3 Maybe I need to redo my 4 paperwork or whatever 5 but --6 JIMMY MILLER: Updating 7 e-mails is very important 8 because obviously there's 9 a change over in 10 personnel, as people 11 retire, people are coming 12 So we try to update on. 13 that as often as possible. 14 SHAUN KEENAN: 15 understand that. But what 16 way was it sent out, just 17 through an e-mail or --18 VP WEST MIANO: Just 19 like one of those 20 newsletters. 21 SHAUN KEENAN: And that 22 was the only form?

JIMMY MILLER: Yes.

23

1	SHAUN KEENAN: We need
2	to see more. That was
3	something that we should
4	be just screaming out.
5	That was a huge win for
6	us. And a lot of the guys
7	that are here right now
8	heard it ffor the first
9	time when it came from
10	that mic.
11	JIMMY MILLER: well,
12	THAT'S part of like we
13	are definitely listening
14	to you. So, if something
15	needs to be done
16	differently as we move
17	forward, we're definitely
18	listening to that.
19	Because we do want to
20	communicate. And part of
21	that, we're actually
22	seeing a pretty good rate
23	of people clicking on

1	those e-mails, about forty
2	percent, which is actually
3	a pretty high number which
4	we're very pleased with.
5	We'd love it to be a
6	hundred percent. People
7	still don't read
8	e-mails
9	SHAUN KEENAN: If it
10	doesn't have pictures,
11	they won't read it.
12	JIMMY MILLER: Right.
13	So, we'll continue to
14	strive to reach out to as
15	many people as possible.
16	JEREMY OSTERHOUDT:
17	Osterhoudt, Eastern
18	Correctional. You guys
19	said we're under contract
20	with you guys.
21	JIMMY MILLER: I'm
22	sorry?
23	JEREMY OSTERHOUDT: You

1	guys said we're under
2	contract with you guys.
3	JIMMY MILLER: Month to
4	month, I believe.
5	JEREMY OSTERHOUDT:
6	Because I wasn't aware of
7	any motion for the
8	contract that went
9	through.
10	JIMMY MILLER: No,
11	we're month to month right
12	now.
13	PRESIDENT POWERS: We
14	initially had this
15	December, was it December?
16	In the packet in December,
17	but we didn't hand out
18	the you have it now, it
19	was sent out a couple
20	weeks ago to all the
21	chiefs, so we'll be moving
22	on that later today.
23	JIMMY MILLER:

1	Thank you.
2	PRESIDENT POWERS:
3	Bill?
4	BILL NAYLOR: Good
5	afternoon. The New York
6	State Retirement online is
7	getting ready to go off
8	line effective April 20th
9	through the middle of May.
10	That's so they can
11	implement their phase two
12	other retirement online
13	project.
14	So, if you have members
15	who are utilizing
16	retirement online to apply
17	for retirement loans, they
18	need to have that in
19	before April 20th. April
20	20th through mid May.
21	They don't have a
22	definitive date on when
23	that's going to be

completed.

I spoke about this before, requests for estimates, you have to be within eighteen months of retiring to submit the request. It is the best number you can get before retiring. If you have twenty-five years or are eligible to retire, then you can submit that every eighteen months as you go forward.

It takes about three or four months to get it back. And, again, it's the best number you can get without actually retiring. The NYSCOPBA dental and VSP open enrollments have gone to an end. So we just

1 concluded that, the 2 sign-ups have been 3 completed and we're moving 4 forward now. 5 Chapter stats, we added 6 95 retirees. We had two 7 honorary retirees added. 8 We've had seventeen 9 members pass. Ten failed 10 to renew. We're currently 11 at ten thousand, 12 ninety-five members in the 13 retiree chapter. Any 14 questions for me? 15 Thank you. 16 PRESIDENT POWERS: Ten 17 minute break and we'll 18 come back into committee 19 reports. 20 21 (Recess taken.) 22 23 PRESIDENT POWERS: All

right. Let's find our 1 2 seats and move into 3 committee reports. Mike 4 Mazzella, Grievance and 5 Legal. 6 VP MID-HUDSON 7 MAZZELLA: Good afternoon. 8 I said, good afternoon. 9 The Grievance and Legal 10 committee convened on 11 February 14th, 2018, which 12 was the day before my 13 surgery. 14 Two grievances were 15 heard and reviewed by the committee. The grievances 16 reviewed involved issues 17 18 of Workers' Compensation 19 and health and safety. As 20 a result of the meeting, 21 the committee recommended 22 that one grievance be 23 closed and one grievance

be pushed forward to step 1 2 three. Any questions? No 3 questions. Thank you. 4 PRESIDENT POWERS 5 Election, Heath. 6 HEATH ALLEN: Heath 7 Allen, elections 8 committee. The election committee met on March 9 27th to set up two vacancy 10 11 elections for the Bronx PC 12 and Mid-Hudson PC. And we 13 also met today to finalize the Buffalo SUNY vacancy 14 15 elections. That's all 16 we're doing. Questions? 17 (No response.) 18 19 VP WEST MIANO: 20 Thank you. 21 PRESIDENT POWERS: 22 Veterans?

ELADIO MARTINEZ:

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Good afternoon. Not much 1 2 to report. Just a few 3 things to cover. The MOU just went out today, all 4 5 the facilities should have 6 the MOU updates and 7 correct applications for 8 the three days for the 9 Veterans. 10 We have problems still 11 with certifying officials 12 that I got to get with 13 Mike and a few others. 14 anybody has problems at 15 your jails with certifying officials, please let me 16 17 know at 18 vetscommittee@NYSCOPBA.org 19 Also, if you have new 20 members coming into the 21 facility, ask them if they're veterans so find 22 23 out who your orientation

i	
1	officer is and make sure
2	you identify the vets.
3	When they come into the
4	facility, into a new
5	facility, you have to
6	resubmit all your
7	paperwork again as a vet,
8	so your DD214 has to be
9	submitted to personnel.
10	And I'm still working
11	on updating the point of
12	contacts for each
13	facility. And the trip
14	for the Vets Tour is still
15	in the process. So, any
16	questions and please if
17	you have new Veterans that
18	come into the facility,
19	have them e-mail me.
20	BILL CONNOR:
21	Mr. President, can I ask a
22	question, it's Bill Connor
23	from Attica?

1 PRESIDENT POWERS: 2 Yeah. 3 BILL CONNOR: Eladio, I 4 have a question about the 5 current bill that was 6 passed about the Veterans. 7 The eight days that is going to be reduced to 8 9 five days. A couple guys came to me and said they 10 11 had already requested time 12 and were issued time under 13 that bill. I said, I'm 14 not sure really how they classify that. What 15 16 happens in that situation? ELADIO MARTINEZ: 17 As far as I know and 18 19 understand, that's pretty 20 much impossible. The 21 eight days got reduced to 22 five days through -- of 23 course Governor Cuomo

reduced it from eight to 1 2 five, put in a chapter 3 amendment to reduce. 4 So it will not take 5 affect until April 1st of 2019, if I am correct. 6 7 Last I knew from Keith 8 Jacques, that was the 9 information I got. And I also heard it from Bill 10 11 Naylor who is the office, 12 so that's the last I know. 13 Keith, am I right on 14 that? 15 KEITH JACQUES: So, the 16 original bill that passed 17 and was signed into law had an effective date, it 18 19 was a delayed effective 20 date and I believe it was 21 April of 2018. So it 22 actually never went into effect before the 23

1	Governor's chapter
2	amendment became law.
3	That chapter from eight
4	days to five days, the
5	number of days the member
6	is allotted. And it
7	pushed off the effective
8	date a little further.
9	ELADIO MARTINEZ: Is
10	that next year, 2019?
11	KEITH JACQUES: Yes.
12	BILL CONNOR: So April
13	1st of 2019 that goes into
14	effect?
15	ELADIO MARTINEZ: Yes.
16	Any other questions?
17	JEREMY OSTERHOUDT:
18	Osterhoudt, Eastern
19	Correctional. I had an
20	issue recently. I was
21	just wondering reservist
22	veterans, they're entitled
23	to Fourth of July as well

as the others? 1 2 ELADIO MARTINEZ: Τn 3 order to get Fourth of 4 July for that day, that 5 day paid, you need to have 6 served in the Reserves in 7 peace time. So it's 8 almost pretty much the 9 older guys that enlisted prior to 2001. 10 11 JEREMY OSTERHOUDT: 12 Okay. 13 ELADIO MARTINEZ: Has 14 to be peace time. And if 15 you have anybody that 16 wants to check it off, if 17 they're reservist, request the date, get the deny 18 19 slip and e-mail me and 20 I'll help out from there. 21 JEREMY OSTERHOUDT: 22 Thank you. 23 ELADIO MARTINEZ: Any

1 other questions? Thanks. 2 PRESIDENT POWERS: 3 Clarence? 4 VP SOUTH FISHER: Ιt 5 had good afternoon 6 everyone. Publicity and 7 meetings met on April 2nd. 8 We discussed quite a few 9 things about what 10 publicity and meetings is. 11 And basically what it's 12 supposed to promote and 13 improve the brand of 14 NYSCOPBA. 15 So, we've been doing a 16 lot of charity work in the 17 past. Recently we ran into snafus with gaming 18 19 laws and commissions and 20 things like that. So that 21 kind of put some of the 22 raffles and things that

we were doing on pause,

23

but not eliminated because 1 2 we're still working on 3 things that way. 4 However, we will be 5 more the boots on the 6 ground when it comes to 7 publicity and promoting 8 our brand. For instance, 9 there's a state fair or something in your neck of 10 11 the woods, we would be 12 there with a booth, 13 handouts, our banner, 14 answering questions, doing 15 things like that. And 16 kind of working in 17 conjunction with Baker and the board. 18 19 And we'll go to 20 different venues per your 21 approval. If you got 22 something in your part of 23 the state that's something

1 big and you may want 2 to see NYSCOPBA there. 3 You present it to the committee, we bring it up 4 5 to the Board, and it would 6 have to be approved by you 7 and we'll go there. And we'll distribute what we 8 9 need to distribute, hand out stuff to the kids. 10 11 Talk about NYSCOPBA. 12 There's a lot of things 13 when it comes to promoting 14 and improving the brand because lately, the 15 convicts have been the 16 victims and we've become 17 18 the bad guys in the eyes 19 of the public. 20 And that's something 21 we -- that needs to 22 change. They need to see 23 what we are and what we

1 actually do. Because we 2 save more lives on a daily 3 basis than they give 4 anybody credit for. 5 don't know how many people 6 in this room have cut down 7 somebody hanging or 8 somebody that cut their wrists and saved their 9 life or put a 10 11 defibrillator or did CPR 12 on one of those inmates. 13 But, oh, no we're the 14 bad guys. So we're going 15 to work on promoting our 16 image and promoting our 17 brand. So, if there's any 18 questions or any 19 suggestions? Thank you. Hold on. As part of 20 21 publicity and meetings, 22 meetings is part of it, 23 thanks to my brother Chris

1 Summers here, there's been 2 a couple of proposals for 3 2020 Executive Assembly. We were asked to have 4 5 some of our Executive 6 Assemblies at areas that 7 were more family friendly, 8 so we're not just stuck in 9 hotels during nice 10 weather, you can bring the 11 kids or whatever and go 12 out somewhere. 13 Well, we have one here 14 for Great Escape Lodge 15 Indoor Waterpark, which would be scheduled for the 16 17 2020 season. It has indoor waterpark and stuff 18 19 for the kids, things like 20 that. But when we get 21 these all together, it 22 would be brought out as 23 proposals for everybody to

1 vote on. 2 Also Lake Placid with 3 different events. This is all Lake Placid. 4 5 RECORDING SECRETARY 6 SUMMERS: Those dates are 7 being held for us right now for 2020. 8 9 VP SOUTH FISHER: For 10 Great Escape, you may want 11 to write this down, July 12 15th and 16th of 2020. 13 For that EA, we're looking 14 at Great Escapes Lodge and 15 Waterpark. What part of the state is this in? 16 17 Lake George. Thank you. Then the Crown Plaza in 18 19 Lake placid. And that 20 would be for July, around 21 the same time. So we have 22 to vote on -- same dates that are being held for us 23

1	so we'll have to make a
2	decision on which one we
3	want to go to. We don't
4	want to do that do today
5	do we?
6	PRESIDENT POWERS: It's
7	for review.
8	VP SOUTH FISHER: Okay.
9	So we'll make sure this
10	information is distributed
11	and at the next EA we'll
12	make a decision.
13	TOM RELYEA: Relyea,
14	Hudson. As far as that
15	Great Escape one goes, you
16	should really do your
17	homework with that place.
18	VP SOUTH FISHER: Talk
19	to me.
20	TOM RELYEA: I just
21	stayed there with my kids,
22	I won't be going there.
23	That place is horrendous.

1 Absolutely horrendous, 2 like disgusting. Probably 3 one of the worst places 4 I've ever been at. 5 VP SOUTH FISHER: Is 6 that the Lake George one? 7 There you go, that was 8 simple. That was simple 9 Next? RECORDING SECRETARY 10 11 SUMMERS: Just to let you 12 guys know, I followed the 13 direction of the EA with both of those hotels to 14 15 talk about it at this one. 16 Those hotels are only 17 going to hold those dates for us probably until next 18 19 month. 20 That's why when I read 21 the minutes that's what 22 was brought to us to look 23 into those two places.

1	we got the dates, they
2	came in yesterday. Lake
3	Placid took their sweet
4	time getting it to us.
5	But we have them here,
6	I can do whatever you guys
7	need, but they're not
8	going to hold it until the
9	next EA, just to let you
10	know.
11	VP SOUTH FISHER: Mike?
12	MIKE CARLSON: Mike
13	Carlson, can we move
14	forward to Lake Placid?
15	VP SOUTH FISHER:
16	That's up to the body.
17	MIKE CARLSON: Let's do
18	it then if we're going to
19	do it.
20	VP SOUTH FISHER:
21	Mr. President?
22	PRESIDENT POWERS: Hang
23	on. We have a motion that

1 was placed in February and 2 until we are --3 CHRIS HICKEY: Hickey, 4 Wyoming. Just -- we've 5 been to these places, 6 okay, over the past couple 7 years. Just having been 8 directly involved in the 9 negotiations with these companies, Great Escape, 10 11 seemed like the management 12 company changed every 13 couple years. You got to 14 be aware of that. 15 Go up to Lake placid 16 for the summer, that's great. You can look off a 17 mountain top, maybe play 18 19 some golf, go swim in a 20 pool. So, you here's part 21 of the process I believe 22 should happen. Take a look at what the 23

1 contract entails, what the 2 dollar cost is, give it to 3 the finance committee. know they would say, look 4 5 it, book the dates. They 6 want us to book the dates 7 because they probably 8 don't have anybody booking 9 the dates in 2020. That's 10 part of the ploy too, just 11 so everybody is on the 12 same page and understands 13 this. So, if you want to go, 14 15 you go. If you want to 16 have a meeting, then come to the Double Tree or 17 18 wherever we're at today, 19 right? 20 VP SOUTH FISHER: Okay. 21 PRESIDENT POWERS: So. back in February we had a 22 23 motion regarding the 2020

1 EAs, so with that being 2 said obviously there's 3 more work that needs to be done here. I don't know 4 5 if it's feasible to 6 actually pull this off for 2020 for a family oriented 7 8 establishment, whether it 9 be in Lake placid, New 10 York City or wherever, 11 wherever the case may be. 12 But we've got these 13 dates that pretty much 14 stick to the schedule that 15 we're in to now that 16 eventually we're going to 17 have to move. And if 18 Great Escape is a piece of 19 crap and Lake Placid --20 Lake Placid is a nice 21 area, but in the same 22 breath eventually we're 23 going to have to move on

these dates to secure 1 2 these dates here and in 3 Albany. 4 So, with that being 5 said, we're going to have 6 to move here pretty quick. It sounds to me like 7 8 publicity and meetings 9 might have some more work to do in my opinion and 10 11 maybe set it up for 2021. 12 MIKE CARLSON: Why not 13 2025. PRESIDENT POWERS: 14 15 You'll probably be the 16 only one still here, Mike. 17 VP SOUTH FISHER: 18 publicity and meetings, 19 I'll tell what we will do, 20 I'll say, everybody should 21 have my e-mail address. 22 If you have some 23 suggestions, e-mail me and

we can online do research 1 2 and go from there and we 3 can discuss it. And then -- but the thing is 4 5 for 2020 we're kind of on 6 a timeline. 7 So being that said, 8 it's your decision where 9 do you want to go. 10 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: 11 We want to go to your 12 house. 13 VP SOUTH FISHER: 14 You're more than welcome. 15 Matter of fact, I have a 16 twin bed and it's only one 17 bedroom. I'm sorry, I've worked in prison a long 18 19 time. 20 PRESIDENT POWERS: Give 21 the guy a microphone 22 and this is what you get. 23 VP SOUTH FISHER: Let's

1	get this going to try to
2	get the date over with.
3	Niagara Falls?
4	All right, for 2020,
5	we're going to stick to
6	the two choices we have
7	now. For 2020, we're
8	going to stick with the
9	two choices we have now,
10	then we'll discuss 2021.
11	So, for 2020, Lake Placid,
12	yes, no?
13	MIKE CARLSON: Yes.
14	PRESIDENT POWERS:
15	Clarence
16	VP SOUTH FISHER: I'm
17	not trying to pull a vote,
18	I'm trying to see who
19	wants what. I'm sorry, go
20	ahead, Derrick.
21	DERRICK HALE: Derrick
22	Hale, Bedford Hills. I
23	don't know if this has

anything to do with what 1 2 you're talking about, but 3 what about a NYSCOPBA 4 Olympics. We talked about 5 it a few years ago and 6 nothing ever happened to 7 I know we don't do it. 8 the DOCCS Olympics 9 anymore, but would you 10 guys be against trying to 11 start that up again? 12 VP SOUTH FISHER: That. 13 wouldn't be us. I quess 14 that would be something we 15 discuss with the 16 department. 17 DERRICK HALE: Not the 18 department, our own 19 NYSCOPBA thing. 20 VP SOUTH FISHER: 21 don't know. Would that be 22 under publicity and

meetings? We can talk

2	DERRICK HALE: I'm
3	trying to have a NYSCOPBA
4	Olympics, like we used to
5	have with DOCCS but just
6	NYSCOPBA.
7	PRESIDENT POWERS: I'm

11	VP SOUTH FISHER: If
12	there is no decision and
13	there's no questions
14	PRESIDENT POWERS:

18	going to do a little more

21	CHRIS HICKEY: Can I
22	make a suggestion? If the
23	body truly wants to do

1 that, I would suggest we 2 entertain a motion to go 3 to one of those venues, 4 you know, where we go is 5 really kind of irrelevant 6 to a certain degree. 7 You just want a family 8 friendly atmosphere, for 9 one of the meetings. 10 as long as we get the go 11 ahead, then getting the 12 logistics done with 13 wherever we're going to 14 go, we're good. Personally, we did the 15 16 traveling road show for a 17 couple years and to be honest with you, it cost a 18 19 lot of money and got to be 20 a real pain in the neck, 21 it really did. 14	tentative. We didn't even
15	do the dates, so it's
16	tentative 15th, 16th,
17	July.
18	PRESIDENT POWERS:
19	Tentative, would be
20	tentative.
21	CHRIS HICKEY:
22	Thank you.
23	PRESIDENT POWERS: To

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1	tentatively approve July,
2	2020. Any other further
3	discussion? All in favor?
4	
5	(All respond with aye.)
6	PRESIDENT POWERS:
7	Anybody opposed?
8	
9	(No response.)
10	
11	PRESIDENT POWERS: All
12	right. Seeing that this
13	wasn't on today's agenda,
14	the 2020 dates, is the
15	body amenable to moving
16	the 2020 dates at this
17	time?
18	VP SOUTH FISHER: Is
19	that it for me?
20	PRESIDENT POWERS:
21	That's it for you man.
22	Have a seat. All in
23	favor.

signify by saying aye. 1 2 3 (All respond with aye.) 4 5 PRESIDENT POWERS: 6 Approved. Back to 7 committees. Shaun? 8 SHAUN KEENAN: Good 9 afternoon. Legislative PAC, quickly I'll do the 10 11 account. Starting balance 12 as of 2/27/18, one hundred 13 six thousand five hundred 14 and seventy-four. 15 Deposits and transfers for 16 March were twenty-five 17 thousand. Total income, 18 twenty-five thousand 19 there. 20 Checks paid out, 21 sixty-two thousand. Total 22 expenses was sixty-two

thousand. With an ending

balance of sixty-nine 1 2 thousand, five hundred 3 seventy-four. 4 I can't express enough 5 that you guys got to get 6 out there and talk to your local officials that are 7 8 your assemblymen, 9 senators, tell them 10 thank you for their help 11 in this budget. It starts 12 there and works its way 13 back to Albany. We get into Albany as 14 15 the Legislative PAC, and 16 we talk, and Keith and Dan 17 and Chris and Mike and Tammy run around and the 18 19 LOB and the Capitol, and 20 we talk to those 21 individuals, but it still 22 comes back to your home

areas.

Whether you call them,
leave them a voicemail
whatever. Assemblymen,
Senators, call and say
thank you. Let them know

you're there and whereyou're from. Because when

8 we step up, they remember

9 that stuff in Albany. And

it helps us get these

things passed.

I don't know what else.

Guys, just because there's

no EOL time, guys, come

out, see these people out

at work here. They want

to see you, they want to

18 hear the stories. We

can't do our work without

20 you guys coming out and

21 telling the stories out

22 here.

23 And they do want to

1 hear them. We need help. 2 If you guys know there's 3 some people on the fence, 4 you happen to know them in 5 your areas, that's a voice 6 we can take back to Albany 7 with us and they can look 8 at it. 9 So please, get involved. If you're not 10 11 going the one that's going 12 to be involved, find 13 somebody at your facility 14 to be involved 15 politically. A lot of 16 people don't like the 17 political game. It does suck. It's backstabbing, 18 19 but it's a necessity. 20 Anybody got any questions? 21 22 (No response.) 23

1 PRESIDENT POWERS: 2 Thank you, Shaun. 3 Toby, Finance? 4 TREASURER HOGAN: 5 Okay. Finance Committee 6 met on March 13th to go 7 over the motion about 8 creating a PR campaign 9 focusing on our members safety in our facilities 10 11 and work sites. And about 12 the cost of seven hundred 13 and fifty thousand. Mike? 14 MIKE MOROSEY: Morosey, 15 Collins. I'd like to 16 withdraw that motion. 17 TREASURER HOGAN: All 18 right. Motion withdrawn. 19 PRESIDENT POWERS: We 20 need sixty percent 21 approval to move that 22 motion. All signify by

saying aye.

9	PRESIDENT POWERS:
10	Thank you.
11	TREASURER HOGAN:
12	That's all I got.
13	PRESIDENT POWERS:
14	John, you're up.
15	VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
16	HARMON: Since the last
17	Executive Assembly
18	meeting, right before the
19	last Executive Assembly
20	meeting we were notified
21	about Part KK in the
22	budget. After Part KK was
23	introduced, we came out

ten times since the last
Executive Assembly
meeting.

We discussed a range of things, including part in the past, we attended some fundraisers and lobbied some of the state legislature based on Part KK and what was going on with the collective bargaining process.

We also revisited other proposals that we went through from the last deal and all other aspects of it, to just look at in case we went back into negotiations. Because at that time, negotiations was completely at a hold until the budget deal was either passed or defeated.

1 We also discussed, you 2 know, differing 3 negotiating tactics if 4 there was a possibility 5 we were told that Part KK 6 can come back as a 7 negotiation, not 8 necessarily up or down. 9 So we came out to also discuss what would be 10 11 discussed if the state 12 legislature or the 13 Governor came back and 14 said, you're going to have 15 to eat this some way or another. So, you're going 16 17 to have to try to negotiate it during the 18 19 budget, which has happened 20 previously with other 21 legislation. 22 We also began to 23 prepare for Interest

Arbitration if that was 1 the direction. 2 We discussed, you know, what 3 panel members do we choose 4 5 or how to choose a panel 6 member, what type of panel member to choose. There's 7 a whole bunch of different 8 9 options that we were discussing, throwing ideas 10 11 back and forth; pretty 12 much everything was on the 13 table. 14 We also were looking at 15 issues more importantly 16 that were going to affect 17 the future of negotiation, Interest Arbitration, what 18 19 would be discussed in 20 mediation and fact 21 finding; and I was told a 22 legislative hearing. I'd like to have 23

1	consent to go off the
2	record, if possible.
3	Everybody in favor of
4	going off the record.
5	
6	(All respond with "aye.")
7	
8	VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
9	HARMON: Anybody opposed?
10	
11	(No response.)
12	
13	(Off the record
14	discussion.)
15	
16	VP LAW ENFORCEMENT
17	HARMON: Go back on the
18	record. That's all I got.
19	PRESIDENT POWERS:
20	Scott Carpenter, the OSI
21	committee.
22	SCOTT CARPENTER:
23	Good evening. We, the OSI

committee met this 1 2 morning. We discussed --3 We had a meeting with 4 Steve Barr and Darren 5 Miller from OSI on Friday, 6 April 6th. 7 We called the meeting 8 after several of the 9 facilities that have gone 10 through OSI frisks that 11 reported the actions that 12 are detrimental to our officers and to our 13 14 membership. 15 So, we reached out to OSI and said we need to 16 17 have a sit down with you guys and we did. Friday, 18 19 we met at the NYSCOPBA 20 headquarters and we 21 strategized before going 22 into that meeting. And it 23 was myself, Andy Lashua

from Green, Tammy Sawchuk 1 2 and John Roberts. 3 We were -- again, 4 we were going to meet with 5 just Barr and Miller. 6 Tammy suggested that we're 7 probably going to run into 8 some interference if we 9 get there, that Mr. Martuscello and Mr. 10 11 Shipley will try to attend 12 this meeting as well. We 13 didn't want that. 14 When we got to DOCCS 15 headquarters, Building 9, 16 sure enough, Mr. Shipley and Mr. Martuscello were 17 in the room. Tammy did a 18 19 heck of a job stating our 20 opposition that we did not 21 want those two gentlemen 22 in the room, because we 23 felt it would just make

the conversation that much 1 more difficult. Because 2 3 with Mr. Martuscello and Mr. Shipley, they want to 4 5 direct every aspect. 6 We were concerned that it wouldn't be able to 7 8 speak frankly. After 9 discussion for a few minute, suffice to say 10 11 they left. Mr. Shipley 12 wasn't too happy, but they 13 left. 14 Once they were gone, 15 we had a frank conversation. Don't like 16 17 the way their OSI agents are conducting themselves, 18 19 plain and simple. You go 20 and frisk a cube, you 21 identify yourself, you 22 leave receipts, inmate 23 knows who. Not comparing

you to inmates, obviously, 1 2 but what we're asking 3 because if OSI is going to 4 do facility frisk, going 5 to do an employee frisk, 6 that they properly 7 identify themselves and 8 leave documentation for 9 each member to know exactly who was doing 10 11 what. 12 A lot of the 13 inconsistencies at 14 Upstate, Clinton, Green 15 frisks were discussed at 16 length. They were --17 Mr. Maher and Mr. Miller were very receptive to our 18 19 discussions, very 20 receptive to our 21 suggestions first and 22 foremost, most 23 importantly.

1 We really -- we want 2 them -- if you're going to 3 have facility frisks, notify the NYSCOPBA 4 5 stewards so that they can 6 be present. And they 7 weren't shooting any of 8 that down. We're going to 9 follow up with Mr. Maher in a few weeks and we're 10 11 going to have a continued 12 discussion with him. 13 And they're interested 14 in having at least maybe 15 having quarterly 16 discussions. So, it's 17 going to continue and in June, of course, we'll 18 19 report back when we have 20 more to give you. That's 21 about it. Anybody got 22 anything? Nothing? Okay. 23 Oh --

1	KAYE GORDON: Kaye
2	Gordon, from Taconic. You
3	can have as many
4	discussions with OSI,
5	because we were either
6	number three or number
7	five. It's the same
8	consistency they've shown,
9	the total disrespect.
10	Now, if what was the
11	basic point of your
12	discussion with them? Did
13	anything come about it?
14	Because if we were number
15	five and the first when
16	Green stood up and said
17	they had a problem with
18	the lockers being
19	destroyed, if they didn't
20	learn then and we're
21	number five, number four,
22	number seven can come
23	along and they're doing

the same thing. What's 1 2 the difference? 3 SCOTT CARPENTER: The 4 conclusion we came to is 5 that with each passing 6 facility frisks, they're 7 getting better at not just 8 going in and being animals 9 about it. They have a 10 ways to go and we're going 11 to keep holding their feet 12 to the fire. Clarence 13 brought to Tammy issues 14 that we were brought up at 15 the meeting about the Taconic frisk. And we 16 17 told them we're going to follow-up once we get more 18 19 documentation of what 20 happened out at Taconic. 21 KAYE GORDON: Which I 22 have more. 23 SCOTT CARPENTER: We'll

1	be presenting that to
2	Steve Maher.
3	KAYE GORDON: But
4	they're not new, they need
5	to stop acting new. They
6	need to stop acting as if
7	they've never been
8	officers or they've never
9	had a frisk. They go
10	through almost the same
11	training that we go
12	through with proper
13	frisking or proper patting
14	down, with property
15	identification, with
16	proper everything.
17	They're not new.
18	They're just only
19	separated. So because
20	you're separated it gives
21	you a different plateau?
22	So, what kind of plateau
23	do they have? What

quidelines do they have? 1 2 What do they go through, 3 what is their training? 4 Because if not, they're 5 still under DOCCS. 6 NYSCOPBA. They only 7 separated but they're 8 still NYSCOPBA. So, I 9 don't understand why we're evening having a 10 11 discussion about how 12 they're acting. What 13 law -- are they just being 14 rogue? I just don't 15 understand it. And the outcome of what 16 17 they're going through and how they're displaying 18 19 their authority, it is to 20 the point the discussion 21 is beyond because they're 22 still acting new. 23 SCOTT CARPENTER: Part

1	of it is that we have to
2	remind our members,
3	especially new members
4	that you have rights. And
5	just because a guy walks
6	up to you in the parking
7	lot and says, hey, hang up
8	and phone and step inside,
9	tell him to go make a ham
10	sandwich. You're not on
11	duty until you're on duty.
12	As to your specifics at
13	Taconic, we are going to
14	look into that.
15	KAYE GORDON: Okay.
16	SCOTT CARPENTER: All
17	right. Thank you.
18	Anybody else?
19	MATT KEOUGH: Matt
20	Keough, Great Meadow.
21	There's no discipline
22	we're disciplined on a
23	daily basis for stuff

1	that it's asinine some
2	of the stuff we get
3	disciplined for. Who
4	disciplines these guys?
5	If I step out of line
6	and I incorrectly pat
7	frisk an inmate, he
8	grieves me, I get a
9	harassment from the
10	captain, I have to write a
11	to/from, all that
12	bullshit. These guys can
13	do whatever they want to
14	us and there's no
15	repercussions.
16	I know the guys at my
17	facility. The morale at
18	my facility is in the
19	shitter right now. We've
20	got a lot of stuff going
21	on in there. And these
22	guys just keep piling it
23	on. And there's

absolutely nothing, you 1 2 sat down with them and 3 what, scolded them? 4 There's no discipline. 5 Why don't they face 6 discipline for the stuff 7 they do to us? 8 SCOTT CARPENTER: Well, 9 you would have to file 10 your diversity of 11 management claims. You're 12 right. 13 MATT KEOUGH: Who runs 14 Diversity and management? 15 SCOTT CARPENTER: I'm 16 in agreement with you. 17 These are the conversations we need to 18 19 have. And hopefully going 20 forward we're going to 21 have continued 22 conversation with OSI to 23 get them better, so

1	they're not just wrecking
2	on you guys.
3	PRESIDENT POWERS:
4	That's why it's important
5	for you to get us that
6	information. I mean, we
7	can't we can surely
8	and don't think for a
9	minute that we don't ask
10	for it. We've on numerous
11	occasions through
12	information, good viable
13	information with
14	documentation have been
15	able to have
16	administrators
17	disciplined, put on admin
18	leave or suspended and
19	pushed to retirement.
20	You know, but we got to
21	have the information. And
22	you're right, Matt, we
23	don't see what that

1	discipline might be.
2	Could be a slap on the
3	wrist, might be nothing.
4	But you can be rest
5	assured we're always
6	calling for it.
7	I probably speak for
8	everybody up here every
9	time you turn around, if
10	that was one of us, we'd
11	be looking at the door.
12	So that's constantly being
13	said, but they're
14	management and they manage
15	their own. And
16	unfortunately we don't see
17	what their discipline
18	comes down, if there is
19	actually any.
20	But it doesn't go
21	without a suggestion, be
22	rest assured of that.
23	SCOTT CARPENTER:

1 Anybody else? 2 ANDY LASHUA: Lashua, 3 Green. In defense of the 4 meeting itself in the case 5 with Taconic, that was 6 brought up -- the Taconic 7 issue was brought up 8 during the meeting. 9 addressing that, you know, they can't address that 10 11 issue because it already 12 happened, so now they're 13 aware of it. 14 As far as dealing with 15 other issues, making them 16 provide documentation when 17 you're getting searched, now they're held to a 18 19 little bit more of a 20 standard because now we 21 know who is he. He's not 22 a mystery investigator 23 just going through the

line. 1 2 This part of the 3 process, as opposed to doing absolutely nothing, 4 5 I prefer this method of 6 opening the door. It's 7 not like the OSI 8 investigators are telling 9 their bosses that they're 10 violating us. They're 11 telling them, hey, we're 12 doing a great job. Of 13 course they are. 14 So, it's kind of -- a 15 few times when we brought 16 a few subjects up, their 17 eyes got big because that's not what they're 18 19 being told by their 20 people. They were 21 surprised, genuinely 22 surprised. 23 So those two

individuals Darren Miller 1 2 and Steve Maher, not being 3 associated with DOCCS per 4 They kind of came 5 from the outside. I'm a 6 little bit more optimistic dealing with them because 7 8 they're not under the 9 thumb per se of the 10 department. 11 They don't owe anybody, 12 they didn't rise 13 through the ranks with 14 everybody or work a block 15 with somebody, have any skeletons in the closet 16 17 with anybody. So, I would prefer that 18 19 this method play itself 20 out and see where it goes. 21 Hopefully we can produce 22 some change where they 23 treat us with respect that

1 we deserve. Because prior 2 to that, there was no 3 checks and balance. And by the way, if you 4 5 do have an experience with these people and their 6 violations rise to the 7 8 level of judicial ethics, 9 then document it thoroughly and deal with 10 11 it that way. And if 12 they're a NYSCOPBA member, 13 go through that process 14 and hopefully we'll remove them from the union. 15 Not that I want to see 16 17 members lose members, but if he is going to utilize 18 19 his position to violate 20 other members, I don't 21 know want him, I don't

Thank you.

want to deal with that.

22

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1 PRESIDENT POWERS:

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members for the 1 association shall 2 automatically be increased 3 4 by the same percentage as 5 the increase in salary of 6 members of the collective 7 bargaining unit. No such increases in 8 dues of the association 9 shall be effective until 10 11 the effective date of each 12 such increase in salary of 13 members of the collective 14 bargaining unit. The 15 Executive Board, separate 16 to and announce the amount of the revised dues 17 whenever there is to be an 18 19 increase in the dues based 20 upon an increase in 21 salary. 22 Striking the following 23 sentence, dues for

associate members shall be 1 2 twenty-five dollars per year. There shall be no 3 4 dues for honorary members. 5 Adding the following 6 language. Dues for associate members and 7 8 honorary members shall 9 being fifty dollars per 10 year and striking from the 11 original proposal, any 12 future dues increase to the retiree dues will be 13 14 made through a motion 15 slash committee recommendation with final 16 17 approval of the Executive 18 Assembly. 19 The dues obligation 20 shall be waived for any 21 member who has not been 22 taken off their respective 23 agency's payroll due to

1 any of the following: 2 suspension, notice of 3 discipline, military 4 leave, sick leave, FMLA, 5 Workmen's Compensation 6 leave until such time as the member is returned to 7 8 the payroll of their 9 employment or their employment is terminated. 10 11 The wisdom of the 12 proposal, the associate 13 member dues have not be increased since the 14 15 inception NYSCOPBA '99. The cost to maintain 16 17 retiree benefits is costly and increasing, brings the 18 19 chapter closer to being 20 financially solvent in the 21 event of the upcoming 22 federal litigation that 23 has a negative affect on

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1	the organization.
2	Is to have the retiree
3	chapter so with that,
4	any further discussion on
5	this proposed motion on
6	the dues, dues increase
7	for retirees?
8	Seeing none, looking
9	for acceptance of this
10	proposal to send out to
11	membership for
12	ratification. All those
13	in favor signify by saying
14	aye.

18	PRESIDENT POWERS:
19	We're going to get
20	started. We have some a
21	gentleman from Clinton,
22	CST.
23	STACIE MANN: Good

evening, everybody. 1 2 Stacie Mann from Clinton Correctional Facility. I 3 have been an officer for 4 5 eleven years. I'm here 6 today on behalf of the 7 Correctional Security Trust, CST, some of you 8 9 may have known it as 10 lock-out pay. 11 What this trust does is 12 when one of our employees, 13 NYSCOPBA members or it can 14 be civilian people within a correctional facility, 15 16 NYSCOPBA people that are 17 working in psychiatric wards, things of that 18 19 nature, as long as they're 20 a NYSCOPBA member, and 21 civilians that work in a 22 correctional facility, 23 it's two dollars a payday.

For that two dollars a 1 2 payday, when that employee 3 reaches leave without pay 4 status, you are direct 5 billed from our insurance 6 company one thousand, nine 7 hundred forty-three 8 dollars and twenty-six 9 cents monthly to maintain 10 your family health plan. 11 Regardless, maybe 12 you're married, you don't 13 have the insurance, the husband or wife carries 14 15 that plan for both of you, 16 whether you're a single 17 plan or the family plan, we pay the maximum premium 18 19 which is that family of 20 nineteen forty-three 21 twenty-six per month to 22 that employee. It's 23 intended for your health

1 insurance, it goes 2 directly to you. 3 How you choose to use 4 that money is completely up to you. We continue to 5 6 pay you monthly until two 7 things happen. One, you 8 get terminated from the 9 state; or two, you're returned to work. Couple 10 11 other provisions in this 12 trust or things about 13 this, it originated in 14 1991. 15 Currently in 1991 16 we were paying like three 17 hundred thirty dollars family plan premium. 18 It's 19 a sixteen hundred dollar 20 difference. If you have 21 any questions or anything you want to see, I left a 22 stack of claims form out 23

there. I have answered a 1 2 lot of questions today for people. 3 The only thing with the 4 5 civilian staff, they have 6 to remit by personal check 7 to pay their dues. And 8 you also are able to 9 continue in this as a retiree. While you're 10 11 still in service, part of 12 your benefit is three 13 thousand dollar death with 14 a six thousand dollar if it's accidental. And once 15 you're a retiree chapter 16 17 to this trust fund, that's an automatic five thousand 18 19 dollar death benefit to 20 you. 21 And the way you do that 22 is you simply submit your 23 fifty-two dollars, you

will get a bill in 1 2 January, you've got till 3 March to pay it, it keeps 4 you paid up to the 2019 5 year. 6 Any questions I can 7 answer for somebody? 8 know I'm covering this quick, but I don't want to 9 10 buy up a lot of your time. 11 As i said, the 12 applications are going to 13 be out there on the table. 14 There is a website, 15 CSTBF.COM, all of our 16 names, April Rodier, 17 myself, our names are listed on there. 18 There's 19 contact information. 20 I'd be happy to take time 21 during the day to answer 22 any questions anybody has 23 about the policy.

1	Thank you very much.
2	PRESIDENT POWERS
3	Thank you. Well, done.
4	It's a good benefit. I've
5	been a member since I got
6	in. Cindy Goss, Catch A
7	Falling Star. Welcome
8	back Cindy.
9	CINDY GOSS: Good
10	afternoon. It's not
11	evening for me yet. I
12	worked last night, so this
13	is not even lunch time for
14	me but I appreciate the
15	invite to come back and
16	speak with you and share
17	some information about
18	what we have been doing
19	since we're on our third
20	year.
21	As you remember the
22	first year we put together
23	to assist and have a

1 crisis response. The confidential assistance 2 3 program that was separate 4 from any organization 5 attached to anyone that 6 allow the anonymity and confidentiality to the 7 8 members that we were 9 serving. 10 And so we began doing 11 that with cards that were 12 put through, there was 13 letters sent out I believe 14 when you did a mailing to 15 everybody about the services that were 16 17 available. And the phone calls that we started to 18 19 receive. Although, I am 20 located in Western New 21 York and I think that was 22 clarified. We handle 23 calls from any NYSCOPBA

member, that includes 1 2 their family members as 3 well. 4 So it's not just the 5 officer. We handle the 6 significant others, 7 preferably not the 8 husband, wife and 9 significant others at the 10 same time. But we do 11 handle children, anybody 12 who calls us, whether it's 13 my uncle's friend's 14 friends, we will help. 15 will assist, we will give information to link that 16 17 person or persons up to the resources they are 18 19 looking for, which is the 20 main goal of what the 21 priority is for these individuals. 22 23 And it initially

started because 1 2 unfortunately the 3 incidences of suicide amongst our members, which 4 5 is why we were doing what 6 we were doing. Shortly 7 after we started, the Executive Board had 8 identified and located 9 grant monies that were 10 11 available through the 12 state to do training. 13 And as a result of the 14 monies that we had applied 15 for, we were able to 16 provide it was ten but it 17 turned out to be nine total; nine, one day 18 19 conference. Not just 20 training, conferences. 21 And we put together a team 22 and I call them our dream 23 team.

1 Not because they're 2 great, which we are, but 3 the reason is they gave us three weeks because the 4 5 expiration of the grant, 6 to do nine, one day conferences across the 7 8 state. From Western, New 9 York, Malone, down to Sing Sing. And we did it. We 10 11 would leave at Tuesday 12 night to get to a facility 13 that we're driving to. 14 And we would check into a hotel, check out, do a 15 16 training, leave that 17 facility. Go to another hotel, check in, check 18 19 out. And we did rain, we 20 did storm, we did snow in 21 that end of March that we 22 did nine in less than 23 three weeks.

And it was the 1 2 dedication that the folks 3 that I used as a our 4 speakers, understanding 5 the stress and that 6 you were losing members 7 said we need to help these 8 folks. And that's what we 9 did. We had a great time. 10 We met fantastic people. 11 We were at all the 12 quality of life buildings 13 from each facility we were 14 at that were -- sometimes 15 we didn't have everything 16 we needed and we used the 17 wall instead of having 18 what we needed and we 19 improvised and everybody 20 was awesome. 2.1 So it was great to see 22 and meet so many different 23 people throughout the

1 whole state that we went. 2 You know, some of our 3 favorites were up in Malone, there's only one 4 5 car that is rental 6 material from some country 7 guy that we had for one of 8 our speakers who flew in 9 from Massachusetts. And then the plane didn't work 10 11 in the one place, which 12 was a propeller plane, so 13 the airline drove our 14 speaker to Malone. And it 15 was one of those things where the driver looked in 16 the rearview mirror and 17 18 goes, you sure are purdy. 19 So those are some of 20 the experiences we had, 21 right down going to 22 Hudson, which was my

23

favorite. We were tired.

We were exhausted. And 1 2 we're going to Hudson the 3 next morning. And we got close to Hudson and the 4 5 people through the state 6 made a recommendation to 7 go to a hotel. 8 We showed up at the 9 hotel about 8:30 at night, 10 and it's like a huge, 11 beautiful hotel up in the 12 mountains. And it had 13 like three, four hundred 14 rooms in it and we were 15 the only ones there. The 16 only ones there. And the 17 next day when we met the officers, they all said, 18 19 where did you do stay? Do you know that place is 20 21 haunted? It was. None of us 22 23 slept that night but we

1	did it and sacrificed.
2	And the training we felt
3	was very well received.
4	Information that we gave
5	to the members who
6	attended and showed up,
7	that we were able to give
8	them that information in
9	that short period of time.
10	So, it also allowed us
11	to meet more of your
12	members as they showed up
13	for this quality of life
14	type training. In
15	addition to that training,
16	we're offering ongoing
17	stuff. We just recently
18	had a training, the
19	Sheriff's in Niagara
20	County wanted to do, they
21	wanted to put on more
22	peers.
23	I said, would you open

1 it up to anybody? He 2 said, absolutely. And 3 we had a good number of NYSCOPBA members that came 4 5 and attended that training 6 that did what was a peer 7 training. It trained them 8 how to be a peer responder 9 to help their members where they take back to 10 11 their facility. 12 We're doing ongoing 13 training, which our next 14 training is Wednesday the 30th of May, in our area, 15 16 Niagara County, dealing 17 with suicide prevention, education and awareness, 18 19 based on request. 20 Unfortunately, it appears 21 it still seems to be a 22 problem. So it's one of those 23

things that, how do you 1 2 educate everyone who is a 3 member and get to 4 everybody you possibly can 5 to get them information, 6 to get them some training, to share with them the 7 8 resources that they're 9 human beings. That yes, 10 this job sucks; yes, it's 11 hard; yes, it takes away 12 from your family. But it 13 doesn't have to take your 14 life. 15 What resources, what 16 can we put together, what 17 can we do to get to 18 everybody to try to 19 prevent that. And that's 20 kind of the role that 21 we're playing. So the 22 people that we're seeing 23 coming in, we do provide a

1 statistical report to the 2 board that they get at the 3 end of the each year to know the utilization of 4 5 the people who we are 6 dealing with. In fact, I think I 7 8 report monthly so they get 9 statistics to say there 10 are people utilizing the 11 program that we're using. 12 And the statistics that 13 we're kind of finding which is no different from 14 15 county corrections, any 16 other police, fire, EMS, 17 obviously family is the biggest issue. Family 18 19 dysfunction, marital 20 discord, problems with 21 kids. 22 Secondary, we have high rates of substance abuse 23

that we're working with,
making those referrals.

Financial, medical issues
would be kind of the order
that we're seeing of the
people coming in. So,
we're trying to address
the training based on what
the needs keep coming,
what they keep asking for,
what they're looking for.

And even for financial help, they'll say, Cindy, we got financial, like I'm going to write them a check. How much do you need, sir; yeah, we got a couple grand in there for you. But we would refer them based on consumer credit counseling, that they can call, call your bank if there is a

foreclosure, potential 1 2 foreclosure. 3 But we don't give them 4 money, when it says 5 financial assistance we 6 don't provide that. So we 7 clarified that to some 8 folks as well. 9 So, I've met a lot of 10 great people. I have 11 heard a lot of things. 12 We've tried to help the best that we can for all 13 14 of the members to get the 15 assistance. And especially dealing with 16 the break down of our 17 kids, our families, our 18 19 children. Because we're 20 human beings, we have 21 families and our families 22 have problems. Our kids 23 have problems, right? Our

kids get into trouble, 1 2 right? 3 So you hear all the time, well, my kid is here 4 5 and this opiate epidemic 6 that we're having has been 7 an increasingly more and 8 more losing people. We're 9 not talking about rehab, we're talking about 10 11 planning funerals for our 12 children. 13 And it's difficult. Wе 14 love our kids, we have 15 great kids, they make bad 16 decisions and then they 17 get into situations where now they're doing things 18 19 that even can jeopardize 20 you based on what they're 21 doing, but they're our 22 kids. 23 I mean, I survived two

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teenagers. So, I have covered this, I call it sprinkles, other people call it gray, I call it sprinkles. And when you got kids living in your house, things change, they're teenagers. they're cocky, they're arrogant doing things not supposed to do. And then heaven forbid as a parent confronting them, right? I remember my son when he was seventeen after outlining a litany of everything why I was upset with him; and he finally said to me, well then, why did you have me? And I said,

well, we didn't know it

was going to be you.

thought it would be 1 2 somebody with a job, 3 right? They're our kids, we 4 5 love our kids, but our kids need help too. So 6 7 the assistance program is 8 available to you and your 9 children and your immediate family members 10 11 to provide that type of 12 assistance. The goal is 13 linking with you the 14 resources in your geographic area that would 15 16 provide what you're 17 looking for. Whether it's one-on-one, do you need a 18 19 psychiatrist, do you need 20 a medical doctor. Do you 21 have stress, do you have 22 trauma? 23 One of my specialties

is trauma, responding to 1 2 those who have been involved in traumatic 3 incidences. Which is why 4 5 I'm a big proponent of 6 peer training. I shared a 7 few moments ago with 8 Tammy, that we did the two 9 day peer training. And 10 it's trained through one 11 of the number one programs 12 in the country, peer 13 assistance. 14 It gives a basic 15 quidelines for anyone to 16 function as a peer and 17 take it back to your own facility. I know you have 18 19 civilian training, I know 20 you have civilian people 21 who are in your jail or 22 your prison or your facilities. But I can 23

tell you at this last 1 2 training we did, we had 3 some of your civilian 4 people, we had some of 5 your EAP people, we had 6 some of the counselors who 7 showed up at this training 8 because they wanted to 9 learn, they wanted something different. 10 11 And there's some people 12 here who actually were in 13 the training as well. 14 the goal was to, what can 15 we do different, what can 16 we add, what can we add to 17 you. So, I think everybody here has a 18 19 voice. If there is something in specific 20 21 that's not being 22 fulfilled, if there's 23 something specific we

1 could look to do.

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If you want to do a two day training, let us know, we can try to work that out to better prepare you coming into your community, coming into your area to give you better knowledge to help your other people. But the bottom line is, we can be as trained as much, but how do we get to our people? How do we let them know what's available? How do we know they're going to access it? Because unfortunately you have a stigma, a stigma attached to asking for help in the mental

health of the people. And

it's -- do I think it's 1 2 ever going to change? No. 3 But I think if we can 4 reduce that stigma that 5 it's okay, we're human; 6 and if a peer or someone 7 can tap somebody on the 8 shoulder and say hey. 9 And we have many, many referrals from the 10 11 delegates sitting in this 12 room that are referring 13 people saying, okay, you 14 didn't work out here, let's try this, let's get 15 this number here to see if 16 17 we can be helpful to you. 18 So, that's a part of 19 what Catch A Falling Star 20 Addressing anything is. 21 that's brought to us and 22 we can increase anything 23 we can do to help your

members. We are available 1 2 to try and assist to 3 accommodate, anything we can do to continue to move 4 5 forward. 6 So based on that, I 7 just wanted to thank you 8 for the opportunity to 9 share with you. You all 10 have that look on your 11 face because everybody 12 kept saying good evening, 13 that you're looking at 14 dinner and cocktail time. So, I'm certainly not 15 16 going to get in-between that for you. 17 18 I understand everybody 19 has cards. People can 20 call me at any time. 21 Officers can call me and 22 not even identify who they 23 are; we will give them

information. So based on 1 2 that, it was just a basic 3 overview. And if anybody 4 has questions you can call 5 me or see me, I'll be in 6 the back for a few minutes 7 before heading out. 8 the meantime, thank you. 9 And please know I pray for 10 your safety every day. 11 Thank you. 12 13 (All applause.) 14 15 PRESIDENT POWERS: 16 Thank you, Cindy. Can I 17 have unanimous consent to 18 move into tomorrow's 19 agenda.

To create a publicity 2 campaign not to expend 3 more than three hundred 4 thousand dollars, with the 5 funding to come out of 6 reserves. 7 This is campaign will 8 include, but not limited 9 to a new commercial, social media, radio, 10 11 limited billboards as well 12 as other means throughout 13 New York State, including 14 New York City. 15 This campaign will be 16 aired directly at what our 17 members face daily behind 18 the walls and in our work 19 sites. The motion is made 20 by Mike Morosey out of 2.1 Collins and seconded by 22 Tom Guest at Gowanda. Michael? 23

2	withdrew that other
3	PRESIDENT POWERS:
4	Sixty percent, we need
5	approval from the body to
6	entertain this motion.
7	All in favor signify by
8	saying aye.
9	
10	(All response with aye.)
11	
12	PRESIDENT POWERS
13	Opposed?
14	(No response.)
15	
16	PRESIDENT POWERS:
17	Michael?
18	MIKE MOROSEY: I
19	withdrew the earlier
20	motion that we had that
21	was sent to the finance
22	committee, we had an
23	amount of seven hundred

fifty thousand dollars on 1 2 it. We didn't know how 3 high it was going to get. 4 Now, that the PR 5 committee, they actually 6 met with Baker PR, they 7 got a smaller amount, they 8 actually said it would be 9 around three hundred thousand. 10 11 So that's what we're 12 looking to do. We need to 13 get our information out 14 there to people. Spectrum News isn't cutting it, 15 16 period. Our members want to be more visible in the 17 public. And this is what 18 19 we were directed to do and 20 I support it a hundred 21 percent. 22 The social media aspect is the future and that's 23

1 what we got to look at 2 doing that. So, that's 3 it. 4 PRESIDENT POWERS: Any 5 other discussion with the 6 motion? Just for the 7 record here, we are doing 8 other things and I see the 9 wisdom of this. And there 10 are avenues, much of 11 what's talked about in 12 here are already in the 13 works. This is a new 14 commercial and other 15 things. 16 We can surely always 17 enhance our image in other 18 capacities as well. 19 MR. RELYEA: Relyea, 20 Hudson. What's Baker for 21 then, if we're putting 22 another three hundred thousand dollars on the 23

2	what are we paying Baker
3	for? Aren't they supposed
4	to be doing social media?
5	Isn't that what we just
6	saw in the presentation?
7	PRESIDENT POWERS: They
8	do social media. We're on
9	Twitter, we're on

12	MR. RELYEA: So what's
13	the three hundred thousand
14	dollars laid out for then
15	though?
16	PRESIDENT POWERS:
17	Social media, radio,
18	limited billboards, as
19	well as other means
20	throughout New York State
21	including New York City.
22	MR. RELYEA: Okay.
23	PRESIDENT POWERS:

1	Done?
2	DONN ROWE: Rowe, Hale
3	Creek. The last EA we
4	talked about what's in the
5	PR budget, I think there's
6	almost a million dollars
7	in there. How much is
8	that did you guys look
9	at how much of that is
10	contracted out?
11	TREASURER HOGAN:
12	Eighty percent.
13	DONN ROWE: Eighty
14	percent is contracted out
15	on what? What's Ed Lewi,
16	what do we pay Ed Lewi
17	for? What's he a broker?
18	Is he brokering time for
19	us? Ed Lewi Associates?
20	JIMMY MILLER: He's
21	brokering time.
22	DONN ROWE: Brokering
23	time.

1 JIMMY MILLER: They buy 2 the commercials for us, at 3 a fifteen percent discount that basically pays their 4 5 fee. 6 DONN ROWE: Okay. So, how much is left over in 7 8 the PR budget? So, what, 9 two hundred thousand dollars is actually 10 11 expended? 12 JIMMY MILLER: Last 13 year we went through 14 basically everything, we 15 went over. I think we 16 were over. And I think 17 the question on that other one additionally --18 19 PRESIDENT POWERS: 20 Jimmy, come to the mic, 21 please.

DONN ROWE: What do we

got in the budget, the PR

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1	budget? Was it nine
2	hundred thousand?
3	JIMMY MILLER:
4	Somewhere around eight
5	fifty, I thought.
6	TREASURER HOGAN: Nine
7	hundred.
8	DONN ROWE: It's nine
9	hundred thousand. So
10	eighty percent of that is
11	contracted to what?
12	JIMMY MILLER: It's TV,
13	it's radio
14	DONN ROWE: So it's
15	already out there.
16	JIMMY MILLER: Yeah.
17	But it also includes
18	charitable sponsorships as
19	well.
20	DONN ROWE: Well, maybe
21	we need to cut back a
22	little bit on that. I
23	mean, I'd rather see a

break down of what we do, 1 2 what we're doing. If 3 we're going to amend the 4 budget. I mean, I don't 5 see the great need to 6 bring money of reserves 7 for an image enhancement 8 campaign. 9 PRESIDENT POWERS: 10 Nate? 11 NATE VEVONE: Nate 12 Vevone, Auburn. Is this 13 something that should be tabled to the next 14 15 meeting, seeings we haven't entered into a 16 17 contract with them until 18 the next EA. 19 PRESIDENT POWERS: Well, they still work for 20 21 us. We pay them on a 22 monthly basis. Michael?

MIKE MOROSEY: I don't

23

think I'm the only one 1 2 that's pretty unhappy with 3 the way this PR has gone 4 for years now. We have 5 been getting run over for 6 a long time. A lot of our 7 monies is already spent, 8 which Miller just said, 9 it's already accounted for. 10 11 This three hundred 12 thousand that we're 13 looking at, it might not 14 be that much. It's to go after the state a hundred 15 16 percent and we haven't done that. We sat on our 17 hands and we sat back 18 19 waiting and waiting, to 20 push back. 21 And we didn't, we 22 listened to the PR firm at 23 the time, we listened to

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1	Miller. We never went
2	after the state. We need
3	to. It's time.
4	Especially after Cuomo
5	just did what he did with
6	the Thirty Day Amendments.
7	Now is the time to go
8	after him.
9	It's an election year.
10	We have the money in
11	reserves; let's go. Every
12	single person that I
13	talked to said, the union
14	doesn't do enough to get
15	our message out to go
16	after the state, period.
17	I agree with that.
18	AL ZAPPALA: Al
19	Zappala, Shawangunk.
20	
21	(Hand gesture and
22	expression made.)
23	

AL ZAPPALA: That's our 1 2 new battle cry by the way, 3 it's gonna hit the nation. But check this out, I 4 5 agree with what you're 6 saying, we get to get the 7 message across. But it's 8 not the Exec Board, it's 9 not the PR firm, it's us. On the 13th, this Friday, 10 11 12:00 to 5:00 Fishkill is 12 having a rally. 13 This isn't for 14 Fishkill, this is for all 15 of us. Everybody around 16 the state, come on down to 17 Fishkill and show how 18 angry you are. What 19 matters is the numbers. 20 The Governor does not care 21 about inmates and their 22 families, he does not care 23 about us.

He cares about numbers 1 2 and votes. And when he 3 looks out the window and 4 he opens up the newspaper 5 and he sees all kinds of 6 people there, that's what 7 gets him going. We need 8 to start doing that. 9 We can come up here and we can meet and we can 10 11 talk about publicity and this and that, but unless 12 13 you're getting to your 14 members, get out, get in 15 the streets, hold up them 16 signs; that's what makes the difference. 17 And whatever sign 18 19 you're holding, that's 20 what the Governor is 21 looking at. That's really 22 what we need to do. 23 Because that doesn't cost

money. Three hundred 1 2 thousand dollars to come 3 out of our reserves, out 4 of our funds just at the 5 blink of eye to go away, 6 all that does it just make 7 us feel good on the 8 inside. 9 It's not changing anything. But people in 10 11 the street, That is. 12 PRESIDENT POWERS 13 Clarence? VP SOUTH FISHER: 14 15 Clarence Fisher, Southern 16 Region VP. I sit on the 17 committee, publicity and meetings and I sat in that 18 meeting with Baker and 19 20 they gave us the ballpark 21 figure on how much it 22 would cost to get our 23 message out there

statewide.

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However, there was

cost. Everybody from the

city, and we say this all

the time because we never

definitely talk after 1 2 this, because I'm here for 3 you and we can get the 4 door open and some of your 5 ideas can get channeled 6 through me. 7 But as far as the 8 motion, that's up to the 9 membership but I just 10 wanted to give you all a 11 little more insight about 12 what happened at that 13 meeting and some of the 14 things we're already 15 starting to do. 16 TED NEVILLS: Ted Nevills, Watertown. 17 don't disagree with what 18 19 you're saying. I'm not 20 sure about the three 21 hundred thousand dollars 22 in addition to the money 23 we're already spending.

think that needs to be 1 2 looked into more. 3 But I think timing is everything. We are in 4 5 active collective 6 bargaining negotiations 7 right now. If we come out 8 and attack the Governor, 9 which I'm not against 10 that, but right now when 11 we're trying to get 12 through the process and 13 find a way to negotiate an 14 agreement, I think timing 15 is everything.
